Elementary School Activity Ideas

- *Have students draw pictures of career fields they see in their everyday lives
- *Invite family or community members to come in and speak about their jobs
- *Implement a career dress-up day
- *Read career focused books during story times
- *Create a jobs chart for the classroom and assign everyone a job

Middle School Activity Ideas

- *Have students create a family career tree
- *Prepare bulletin board displays with career information
- *Highlight a different career pathway each week
- *Ask the library to set up a career book display table

Hot Jobs in South Carolina

South Carolina is expected to add more than 228,800 jobs between 2012 and 2022, according to new employment projections released by the South Carolina Department of Employment and Workforce. That is a projected rate increase of almost 12% over ten years. Based on the results of the forecast, “Hot Jobs” have been identified as in-demand for this projection period specific to SC. Below are the lists of occupations deemed as hot jobs in great demand for SC between 2012-2022.

- ⇒ Accountants and Auditors
- ⇒ Civil Engineers
- ⇒ Computer Systems Analysts
- ⇒ Computer User Support Specialists
- ⇒ Electricians
- ⇒ Elementary School Teachers, Exceptional/Special Education
- ⇒ First-Line Supervisors of Construction Trades and Extraction Workers
- ⇒ First Line Supervisors of Office and Administrative Support Workers
- ⇒ General and Operations Managers
- ⇒ Industrial Machinery Mechanics
- ⇒ Management Analysts
- ⇒ Market Research Analysts and Marketing Specialists
- ⇒ Medical And Health Services Managers
- ⇒ Middle School Teachers, Special Education and Career/Technical Educators
- ⇒ Plumbers, Pipefitters, and Steamfitters
- ⇒ Registered Nurses

Each occupation meets three specific criteria:

- * Projected growth rate of at least 12% over the ten year span
- * Increase of at least 1,000 jobs over the ten-year span
- * Current average salary level of at least \$38,990

Most in-demand job: Registered Nurses

Highest average salary level jobs: General and Operations Manager (\$99,070)
Medical/Health Service Manager (\$86,520)

Fisher Middle School Mentor Fair

Greenville hosted the Para-Cycling World Championships on August 28 – Sept 1 at the Clemson University International Center for Automotive Research campus (CU-ICAR). This event offered a unique educational experience for students at the Dr. Phinnize J. Fisher Middle School, which is located just within walking distance of CU-ICAR. The Greenville Health System partnered with Fisher Middle School (MS) to offer students a chance to talk with some of the athletes, learn about the engineering of the various bikes used in competition, and even try out a hand-cycle used by world class athletes! The experience this opportunity provided students is both unique and educational, but it is not the only activity that occurred.

Since Fisher MS is the first STEAM-focused school in the state of South Carolina (and one of the first in the country!), the school's counselor, Michelle Kirby, plans enrichment activities with a punch! Along with the cycling event, Ms. Kirby set up a Mentor Fair on Friday, August 29, 2014. Students had an opportunity to talk to local professionals representing some of the various STEAM careers that are available in the 21st Century workforce. Students met representatives from the Peace Center, McMillan Pazdan Smith Architecture, Fluor, and Michelin, just to name a few. The goal of this event was to line up mentoring dates for the students that will occur quarterly around the end of each nine-weeks grading period. More importantly, this event was to allow students the chance to find mentors in fields that interest them, which will provide a student-driven, engaging experience for each student at Fisher MS.

What is Special Populations?

Special Population students are students enrolled in career and technology education programs who receive support services. These groups are identified as individuals with disabilities, individuals from economically disadvantaged families including foster children, individuals preparing for nontraditional training and employment, single parents including single pregnant women, displaced homemakers, and individuals with limited English proficiency.

Individuals who are members of special populations shall be provided with equal access to the full range of career and technology education programs available to individuals who are not members of special populations, including occupationally specific courses of study, work-based learning programs and comprehensive career guidance and counseling services, and shall not be discriminated against on the basis of their status as members of special populations.

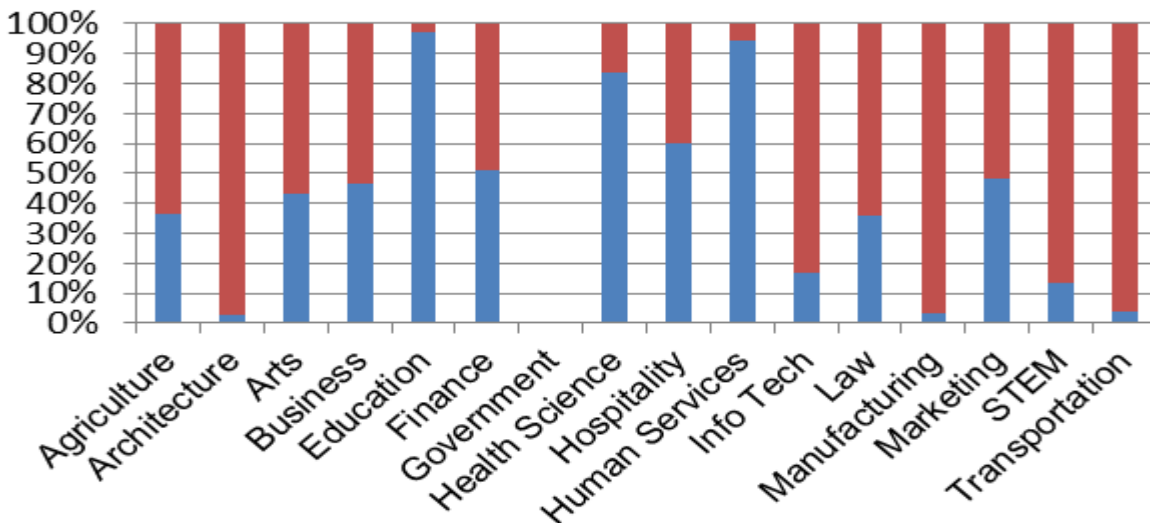
