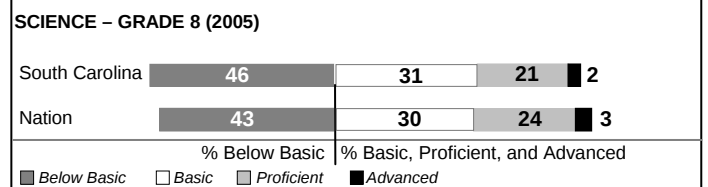
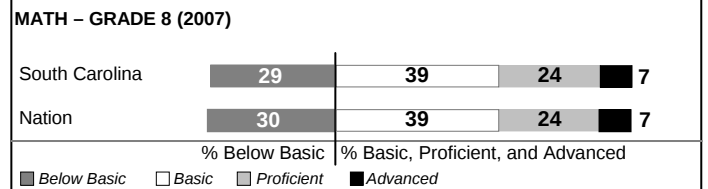
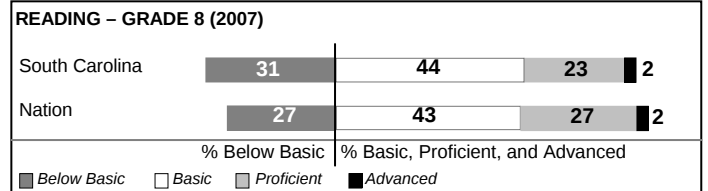
PLACEMENT RATE

REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The Sumter County Career Center continues to serve both Sumter School Districts 2 and 17 while enjoying an extremely positive relationship with its industrial and business partners. Both the center's advisory board and our school improvement council have quarterly meetings, and the director is actively involved with the Industrial Association.

The facility's renovation project continues. A complete renovation of the auto tech, auto collision, culinary arts, graphic communication and nail technology facilities have been completed; restroom renovations are nearly done; a new mechatronics course is being developed; health technology, cosmetology and welding received upgrades over the summer; and the center is introducing a new diesel technology course.

Students attend a daily, twenty-minute Character Education program which addresses a variety of topics such as violence prevention, conflict resolution, etc. Additionally, guest speakers from the community are invited to the campus to address the students. Students are given a number of opportunities to participate in community development activities like Tech Camp, nursing home visits, fundraisers for the American Cancer Society and the American Heart Association Walk, and working with Habitat for Humanity. The center funds the cost of club membership for all students. Every student takes part in an OSHA Safety course and seniors are given COOPing, internship and /or shadowing opportunities. Our masonry, landscaping and carpentry students were recognized by the City of Sumter for their work on a low-income housing project, which was completed over a two month period.

The school is happy to announce that 13 of our students placed in state competitions for their various fields including early childhood, welding, culinary arts, carpentry, and masonry.
