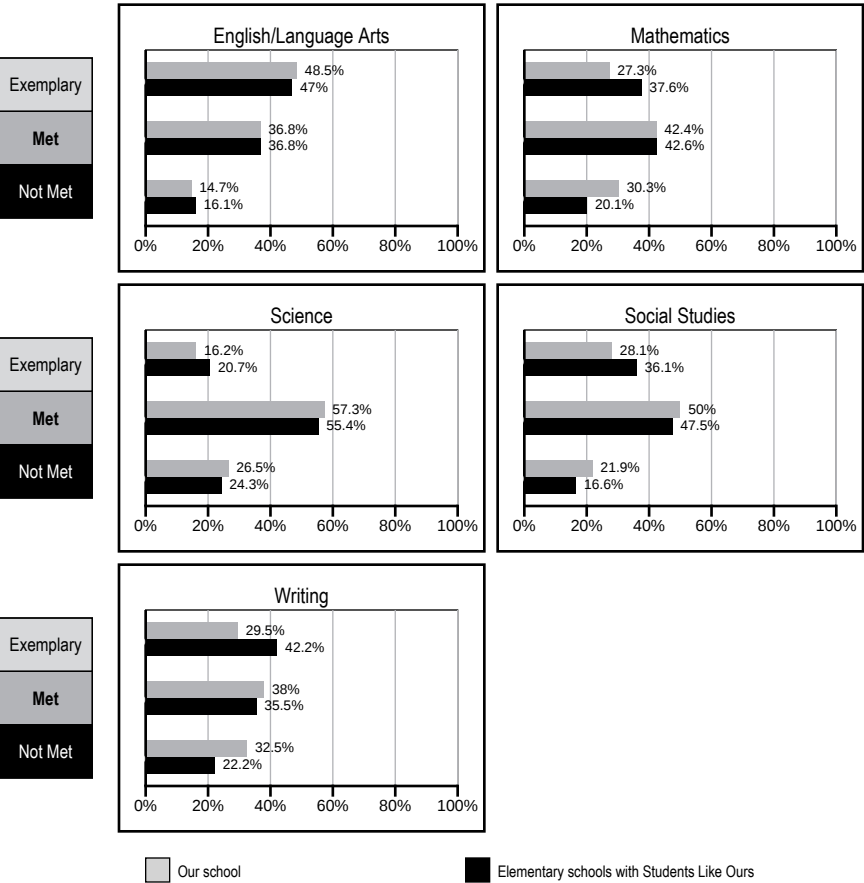

Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Westview Primary School opened its doors in 2002 and serves approximately 975 students in Pre-K through third grade. Our school has space for 50 classrooms as well as a science lab, cafeteria, multi-purpose room, media center, music room, art room and speech rooms. The school has two state of the art computer labs. Students visit one lab on a weekly basis for instruction on keyboarding and other basic computer skills, as well as spending time with the Compass Learning instructional software for review in math and language arts skills. This lab is also used for assessment programs such as Star Reading, Star Math and MAP (Measures of Academic Progress). The second lab is available for tutorial sessions for students identified as "as risk" in reading and/or math. This lab uses Success Maker software. Students also have the opportunity to read books and take Accelerated Reader tests on the computers. AR tests demonstrate the student's ability to comprehend what they have read.

Twelve teachers at Westview Primary School are now National Board Certified; two others are currently pursuing that certification. Our teachers are trained in the Balanced Literacy Model, Everyday Math, "Six Plus One" Writing traits and Foss Science Kits. Teachers in kindergarten, first, and second grade have been trained in and use DRA (Developmental Reading Assessment) and DIBLES (Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills) to assess the reading and literacy skills of their students. WVP has been recognized by the Education Oversight Committee for our high percentage of students meeting or exceeding the 75th percentile in either ELA or math. Our teachers received one-on-one assistance from Dr. Linda Karges-Bone and were awarded grants totaling more than \$16,000, including a \$10,000 BP A+ Energy Grant. Several special education teachers received a grant to support a team from Westview Primary School to participate in the Special Olympics. We have interactive SmartBoards in all of our instructional areas and our teachers have all been trained to use this instructional technology tool through graduate credit college courses and after school workshops.

Parent involvement is especially critical at the primary school level. The PTA and School Improvement Council continue working with our teachers to provide a safe and nurturing learning environment for our students. Our school continues to run Before/After School, Summer and Holiday Camp Programs. Funds from our Before/After School program paid for many of the SmartBoards that were purchased. Funds from our PTA and our After-School program were used for our fine arts programs that are presented to our students throughout the school year. Local and national artists spend time with our students sharing their talents and making connections between their areas of expertise and curriculum standards in English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Funds from these programs were also used to construct an outdoor pavilion which can be used by our teachers for various learning activities. Students at Westview Primary School participate in a variety of programs such as Kids Who Care, The Greater Goose Creek Spelling Bee, Special Olympics, Jump Rope for Heart and a Bicycle Safety Rodeo.
