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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Aiken High School was a recipient of the 2008 Palmetto Silver Award and recognized in the 2008 US News and World Report as one of the top high schools in the nation for improving the achievement gap. AHS offers a varied curriculum that includes the International Baccalaureate Program (IB), twelve Advanced Placement (AP) courses, a college preparatory program, a business program, a Career and Technology program, a Freshman Assistance Program (LIFT), and special education services in EMD, LD, TMD, and Resource. Our students can also choose from 12 athletic sports and 37 student clubs/organizations.

Our students continue to achieve outstanding success: 168 seniors received over \$9.98 million in scholarships and grants; 27 seniors were named Palmetto Fellows Award winners; 2 students received a National Merit Scholarship; 9 students were National Merit Commended Students; 4 students are candidates for the International Baccalaureate Diploma; 1 student scored a perfect 36 on the ACT; and an AHS student received the Youth of the Year Award (second year in a row). Aiken High School students continue to compete and excel in regional, state, and national competitions in Academic Team, Region IV 4-A Athletics, Band, Chorus, Foreign Language, Art, Robotics, Poetry, ProStart Culinary Team, DECA, FBLA, FFA, NJROTC (Distinguished Unit Award, 2nd year), and Yearbook (Excellence Award by publisher, 2nd year).

The Aiken High School staff and student body have excelled in service to the school and community through their participation in many activities. Through the leadership of the Student Council, the faculty and students raised thousands of dollars for various charities including Helping Hands, Camp Sertoma, St. Jude's, Make-A-Wish, Relay for Life, and the SPCA. They also provided Stuffed Stockings (toys and school supplies) for the children in the Department of Social Services custody, and donated approximately 100 pints of blood. The school Chorus provided entertainment and visits on a regular basis to local nursing homes, schools, and community events. The FFA provided flowers to elderly residents of the community and donated fresh vegetables to the Golden Harvest Food Bank. The Aiken High Band and NJROTC actively participate in many community activities including the Veterans Day ceremony, the annual Christmas Parade, and the Memorial Day Parade. In addition, many students assisted with Special Olympics, and several students have been trained to provide peer mediation services. Together the various student organizations logged well over 11,000 service hours.

To promote student success, AHS students are offered academic assistance and tutoring through the National Honor Society, the Learning Logic math program, teacher-led tutorial services, and on-line tutorial services. All students are encouraged to participate in the Accelerated Reader Program sponsored by the Aiken High School media specialists. This year we also implemented a credit recovery program. Many teachers also use technology to aid student achievement through the use of SMART boards, interactive response systems and Moodle.
