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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Bluffton High School provides opportunities for students interested in science and/or technology through four interdisciplinary small learning communities in Business and Biotechnology; Information Technology; Interdisciplinary Studies and Education. Visual Arts Emphasis is placed on the integration of academic and career preparation, incorporating the latest technologies. Bluffton High School offers a broad and challenging curriculum that meets the needs of a diverse population. Learning disabled students and English Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) students are served by specially adapted instructional programs. Bluffton High School realizes that in order educate students in the 21st century; public schools will need to make a drastic change in their approach to learning. Thus, we have established a Credit Recovery Program which allows at risk students to work and earn Carnegie credits toward the completion of their high school diploma using flexible scheduling. This approach has proven to be a successful model for students who would have otherwise dropped out of school.

Students are provided the appropriate preparation they need to enter the workforce, military service or college with approximately eighty two percent continuing their education in postsecondary institutions. Advanced placement courses are available in all areas of upper level mathematics, science, social studies, art and English courses. Students can select from honors courses in all academic areas, three foreign languages, and internship opportunities and on site workforce development training. Bluffton High School administered over 200 Advanced Placement (AP) exams Bluffton High School's ACT and AP scores surpassed both state and national averages. The 2008-2009 graduating class received scholarships totaling over three million dollars.

There is a high level of participation by students and faculty in all aspects of the school program. Faculty and staff members with the support of parents, community and corporate partnerships, provide a learning environment in which all students can participate and0 achieve success in academic endeavors, sports and extracurricular activities.

Other accomplishments include 86 students received life scholarships, the Robotics Team competed at the national level and overall our athletics teams won 70% of all matches/games.
