Definitions of Performance Rating Terms

- * Technical Skill Attainment --- The percentage of students enrolled in career and technology courses at the center who earn a 2.0 or above on the final course grade.
- * Graduation Rate --- The percentage of 12th grade career and technology students who graduate in the spring.
- * Placement Rate --- The percentage of career and technology completers available for placement over a 3-year period who are actually placed in postsecondary instruction, military services, or employment.

Report of Director and School Improvement Council

The Aiken County Career and Technology Center (ACCTC) serves the school District of Aiken County. The school ended the year with one of its highest enrollments ever, 404 students. There were 121 Career and Technology Completers for 2010-11. These students have a four-course concentration in their course of study with many receiving National and State certification.

ACCTC continues to be involved in initiatives tied to Technical Centers That Work (TCTW). A math integration specialist has been put on campus to raise math scores and integrate math with technical areas. Professionalism 101 and 102 has been implemented along with the Capstone Project to incorporate rigor into the course work. The Career Center also went through a two-day Technical Assistance Visit (TAV) to obtain input from across the state on how the Career Center could continue to improve. The Career Center continues to elevate its rigor and technology use in coursework.

The Career Center routinely has students place in the top three in state competitions in Health Science, Cosmetology, Criminal Justice, Drafting, Automotive, and Agriculture. Competition is a vital part of all programs. The Welding program has also started an American Welding Society chapter, the only one in the state.

The Aiken County Career Center has also worked to broaden the horizons of its students and community by starting a German Exchange Program with a school from Manheim, Germany, called Max Hachenburg. Thirteen students and two chaperones came to the Career Center and stayed with American students. Thirteen American students and two chaperones will travel to Manheim in July. It has been a positive educational and cultural experience for all involved.

ACCTC continues to build on its partnerships with Aiken County business and industry partners, which proves to be an essential part of the success of the Aiken County Career and Technology Center.
