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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

T. L. Hanna, An International Baccalaureate World School, located in the growing community of Anderson, South Carolina, has a strong tradition of academic excellence. The diverse student body consists of approximately 1,800 students. The strengths of the school include a rigorous curriculum that prepares students for higher education and the workplace; access to advanced technology; a high-ranking Advanced Placement Program; and a high college-acceptance rate with over \$7 million in scholarships awarded to the Class of 2010. In school year 2010-2011, the first IB courses will be offered. An IB diploma, one requiring increased rigor with a global perspective, is recognized and accepted internationally.

Our challenge continues to be meeting the needs of all of our students. We have an increasing number of students who speak English as a second language; who live in poverty; and who have learning disabilities. Because of the national recession, fewer tax dollars collected, and state budget cuts, our financial woes have increased. Finding alternative sources of funding that are needed to support our many programs is indeed a challenge.

Hanna has a rich tradition of academic and artistic excellence. The school has been named a National Blue Ribbon School of Excellence; Palmetto's Finest; a Siemens award-winner for success in Advanced Placement math, science, and technology; a flagship "School of Promise;" a Gold/Silver Medallion winner in multiple years for success on the state report card; a "Red Carpet School"; and a member of the "200 Club," for our nationally recognized Speech and Debate program. The T. L. Hanna Band has won the grand championship in the Mardi Gras "Rex Parade" each year it has attended the competition. Growth in the arts – band, orchestra, and the visual arts – helps us provide a well-rounded education.

It is with an outstanding faculty, staff, student body, and parental/community support that we continue to strive to be "The High School of Excellence."
