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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2009-2010 school year at Lake City High School (LCHS) was filled with many successes. Our year was full of excitement and successes. We were awarded the Bronze Award by US News and World Report as one of the Top 100 High Schools and we completed our second full year of implementation of the Teacher Advancement Program (TAP).

We implemented an Evening High School Program for the first time this year. This credit recovery program benefited over 200 students. We also continued with our Saturday School Program and our Extended School Year program. We emphasized literacy school-wide by our Silent Sustained Reading and Reading Counts program. We continued to offer double blocked classes for identified ninth graders to increase their skills in math and English.

Our Work-Based-Learning Program continues to place our students in internships their senior year in several areas including culinary arts, health science, accounting, automotive technology, masonry and building construction. Our career center students excelled in a variety of Skills USA competitions and several placed at the regional and state level. Two of our students traveled this summer to the national competition in Kansas City. Our students continued to shine in areas of chorus, band, athletics and JROTC. Several of our athletic teams made it to regional and district play offs and our Boys Basketball team won the Lower State Championship. We also have several students who participated in our Foreign Language Trip to France and Spain this spring. LCHS students gave back to the community in a variety of ways such as blood drives, the March of Dimes drive, the American Red Cross Drive and the Adopt-a-Highway program. We also continued our Advisory Program with our focus on Character Education.

On May 28, 2010, 171 seniors graduated from LCHS. These graduates received \$2,588,400 in scholarships including \$1,040,000 in Life scholarships and \$117,600 in Hope scholarships. Fifty-two students qualified for the Life scholarships and forty-two students qualified for the Hope scholarship. Twenty seniors attained a score higher than 1100 on the SAT or higher than 24 on the ACT which was an increase of thirteen from last year.

We are extremely proud of the accomplishments of the students and staff at LCHS. We will continue to strive for excellence in order to improve all aspects of LCHS.
