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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2009-2010 school year at Boiling Springs High School (BSHS) was filled with excitement. We engaged in many new formative and summative assessments, realigned our instructional strategies, and sharpened our curriculum delivery methodology. Parents demonstrated a strong commitment to their children through continuous involvement in our school with their supportive efforts. Teachers and administrators, in conjunction with the Spartanburg County District Two District Office Staff, continued with the study of BEST practices to improve teaching and learning. Most importantly, students came to our school each day and received a world class education from an exemplary faculty and staff!

Our teachers reevaluated many variables of our school community as a result of our High Schools That Work (HSTW) Initiative. We began revamping our literacy program to include a more robust reading component. We believe this change will impact student achievement in a very positive way. We began developing an advisor-advisee program which will give all students in our educational community an adult advisor to assist them with ancillary problems that they may face during adolescence. Finally, we began developing and implementing a more rigorous curriculum, with an emphasis on differentiated instruction and retesting, to give our students additional opportunities for higher achievement. We believe our students will reap many positive rewards with the aforementioned initiatives.

As always, student achievement is the number one priority at BSHS. Our Graduating Class of 2010 garnered \$11,400,000 in scholarships, surpassing any previous graduating class in our school's history. Additionally, 263 of our 408 graduating seniors received the South Carolina Life Scholarship. We had our first recipient of the prestigious Bill Gates Millennium Scholarship, which will provide financial support for collegiate expenses through a doctoral degree. Our school is blessed with a school board whose emphasis is "Children First" and showed their commitment to this belief by constructing a new media center and athletic facility on our campus. Nineteen BSHS athletes received athletic scholarships which will allow them to pursue their education at the collegiate level. For the first time in school history, a BSHS student-athlete won a South Carolina State Swimming Title in the 200 individual medley. The BSHS Bulldog Marching Band was the 2009 South Carolina Upper State Marching Band Champions in 5A competition. As a result of our family-friendly environment, our school was designated by the South Carolina Department of Education as a Red Carpet School for the first time in our school's history. We certainly had many outstanding accomplishments and reasons to be proud of the students who attend Boiling Springs High School!

At BSHS we are fortunate to be serving a community that supports students and teachers and believes in and appreciates the power of an education. As a learning community, we will continue to work diligently to offer the BEST educational opportunities available to our students. It is our belief that with an appropriate emphasis on Academics, Arts and Athletics, our students will continue to meet the world Ready-to-Lead! Bulldog Pride!
