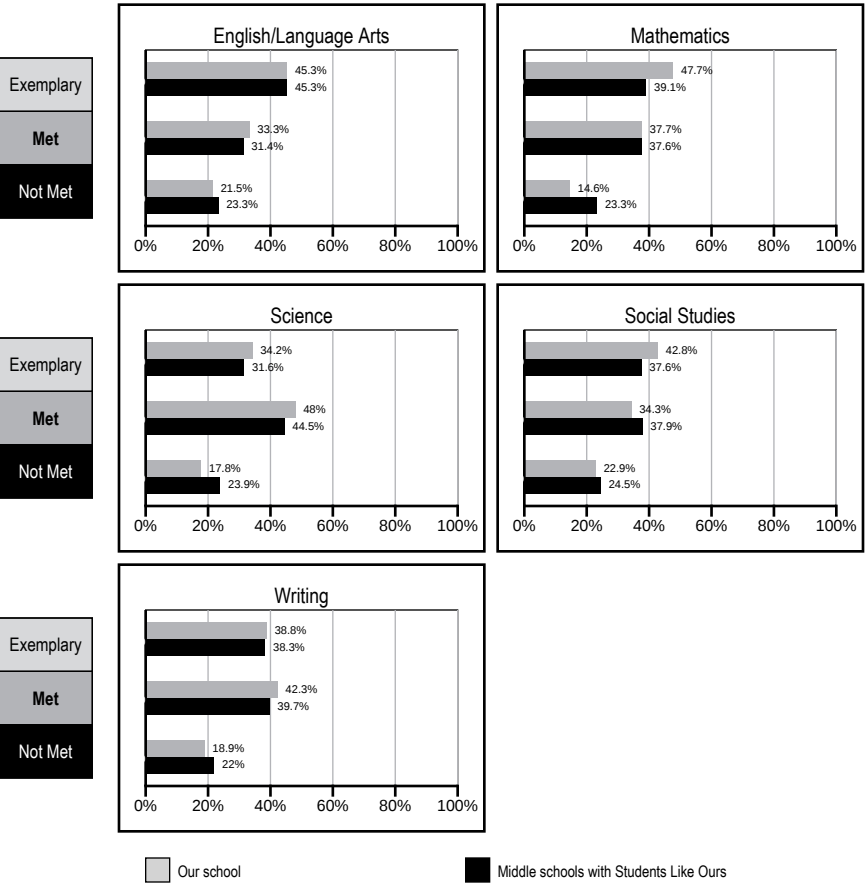

Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2009-2010 School Year has been a year of excitement and success for the faculty, staff, and students of Ocean Bay Middle School. We are proud of the many achievements experienced at Ocean Bay Middle School in our fourth year. The community has provided support and continued assistance to our students and staff. It is with great pride and pleasure that we share the many accomplishments of Ocean Bay Middle with our parents, staff, community, and students. Ocean Bay Middle is proud of achieving Palmetto Silver Award for Closing the Gap. This year Ocean Bay Middle also earned the South Carolina Red Carpet Schools Award. OBMS celebrated and participated in many events, activities, competitions, accomplishments, and new opportunities throughout the year: Fifty members of our Science Club swam with the Manatees in Florida as adventure learning. The Studio Production Club produced the news every day to increase communication to our staff and students. Forty-one OBM students and staff participated in the Special Olympics "Polar Plunge" and raised \$3,900.00.

This year, the number of Fine Arts All-County participants from Ocean Bay Middle was impressive with 3 All-County Orchestra, 1 All-Region, 12 All-county Chorus, 14 All-County Band, 7 for All-Region, and 1 All-State, and of 27 Solo and Ensemble Band Members 20 received Superior ratings while 6 were deemed Excellent. The Black History Program "A More Perfect Union" was a tremendous success focusing on ethnicities, and better tolerance between different races. An Occupational Vehicle Career Day with several community participants was held in which students rotated to each career represented. Virtual Job Shadowing participants, Law Month, and Automotive Career Day were experiences students participated in to gain greater understanding of the work of work. The Good News Card Program continues to recognize and celebrate celebrates the achievements, kind acts, and contributions of students. Community service and Character Education were focuses for OBM and we are proud of the many successes in this area: Spare the Air 2009 Outstanding School recipient, the fall Leadership Class raised \$2,143.00 for Collin's Kids-ATV Safety Awareness Program, the spring Leadership Class raised \$2000.00 for Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Guidance Dept. and the Finance Class raised \$2,362.24 for needy families for the holiday fundraiser.

The 7th & 8th Band traveled to New York to perform at the United Nations International School. OBM students participated in track, cross-country, basketball, baseball, football, golf, tennis, volleyball, cheerleading wrestling, and soccer at the middle school level and at both the Junior Varsity and Varsity level. Ocean Bay Middle School is dedicated to assisting each child to be successful in and out of the classroom. Our dedicated faculty, staff, parents, and community work collaboratively to achieve the highest for each and every student.
