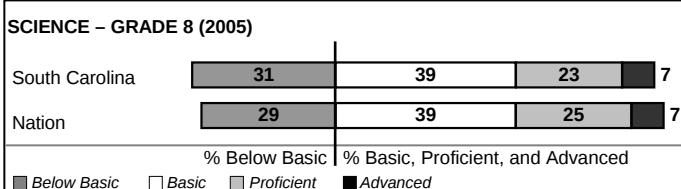
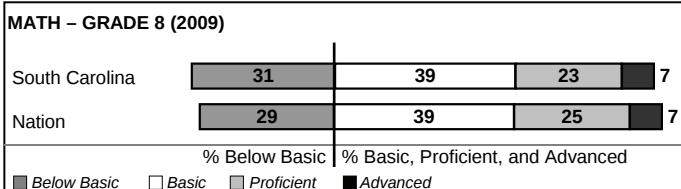
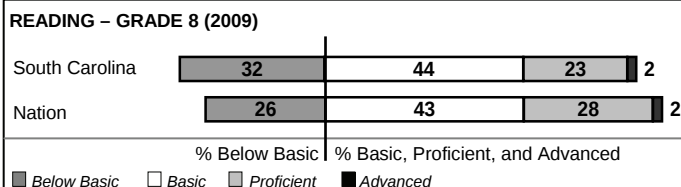
PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

We made great strides in enticing hearts and educating minds in 2009-2010. We continued to fortify our foundation to bridge our academic gap with the support of our parents, community, and Stephen Peters, who stressed the importance of student/teacher relationship building. Our connection with our stakeholders was impacted through our Family Nights and home and neighborhood visits. Thus, we were better able to utilize Positive Behavior Intervention Supports and Student Support Team Initiatives. We enticed hearts by offering 7th grade Single Gender classes, 8th grade laptop computers, Community Laptop Labs, and the initiation of the Student Ambassadors. A group of select students attended a Leadership Conference in Florida, and TAG students were spectators at the USC vs. Florida baseball game. We observed evidence of great minds unfolding through the recognition of one Junior Scholar and one of our 6th graders who represented South Carolina in the National Geographic Bee in Washington, DC; as a result of his winning the state-level competition. Last but not least, our school met AYP. In preparing our students for the future, each grade level visited and explored college life and attended a Career Fair, and some participated in the Job Shadowing program. They were exposed to many jobs through Career Awareness sessions and made knowledgeable of course work associated with specific occupations through the Individual Graduate Plans. We continued our Service Learning Projects and included collecting donations to help aide Earthquake victims in Haiti.
