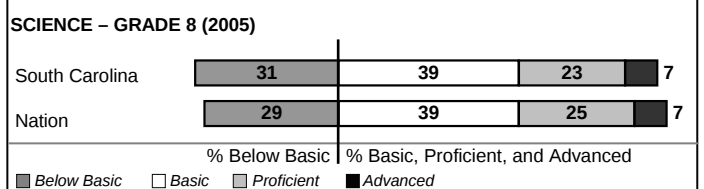
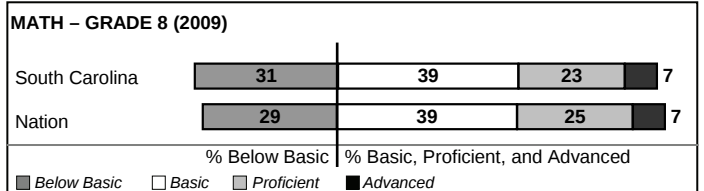
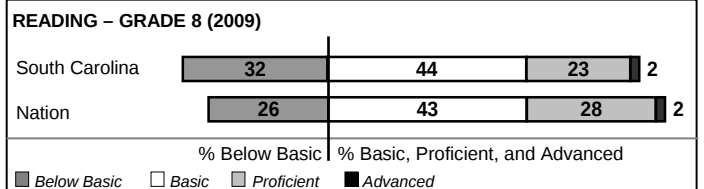
PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Dear Parents,

Conway Middle School achieved a number of successes during 2009-2010. While we have had a number of successes, we still face challenges. We must continue striving to increase levels of student achievement. We must increase the number of students who perform at high levels on state assessments and narrow the achievement gap for at-risk learners.

To aid in our efforts, we focus on data from our school report card and MAP. We use this to drive classroom instruction and to plan for staff development. We are implementing literacy strategies in all classes to promote comprehension and vocabulary acquisition. We have focused on writing and reading during advisory throughout the year based on the needs of students. We utilize the results of the district benchmarks in science and social studies to guide our planning, pace, and to align curriculum. We are continuing with PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention System) and include quarterly reward trips for students without office referrals and have created a system where students can receive daily tokens that can be used to "buy" things and opportunities throughout the year.

Conway Middle School continues to enjoy the support of our PTO and School Improvement Council. Teachers, administrators, parents, and community members will continue to work together to ensure the best learning environment possible for our students.
