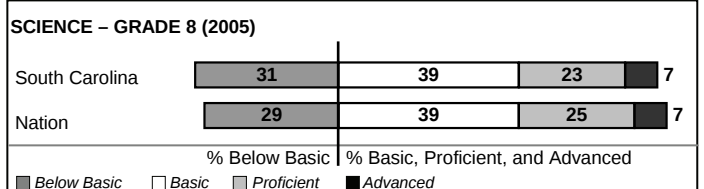
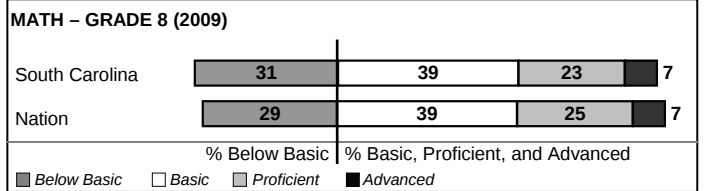
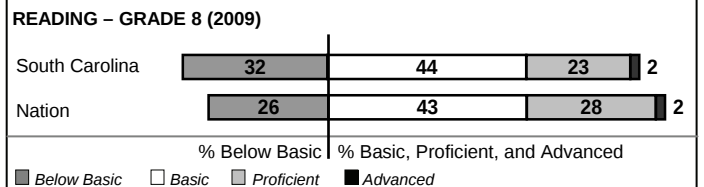
PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Leslie M. Stover Middle School had an outstanding 2009-2010 school year. Literacy across the curriculum continued to be our main focus. Our daily enrichment class included novel studies through three nine-week periods and specific academic remediation during the fourth nine-weeks.

Leslie M. Stover Middle was named as a "Red Carpet School" for 2010-2013 for our family-friendly relationship and communication with the Elgin community. This was Stover's second consecutive recognition.

Our eighth grade class had a total of thirteen students who qualified as Junior Scholars due to their achievement on the Pre Scholastic Aptitude Test. Two seventh-graders were recognized as Duke TIP Scholars for their achievement on the Scholastic Aptitude Test.

The Stover related arts program produced forty students in all-region band and five of these students went on to qualify as All-State Band members. Our chorus program had a record of nineteen students to qualify for All-State Chorus. Student government was very involved in community relations activities. Teachers and students collected over \$5000.00 to support cancer research through Relay for Life.

During the fall, our football team sponsored a food drive effort with a neighboring middle school to collect food items for a recently formed pantry in the Elgin community. The effort was a great community success. Support for this local pantry continued throughout the year.

Leslie M. Stover Middle was again visited and considered as a "School to Watch." Though we did not reach this recognition this year, we will continue to seek improvement to better serve our students. The promising feedback we received indicates Leslie M. Stover Middle School continues to pursue excellence for the students it serves.
