Definitions of Performance Rating Terms

- * Technical Skill Attainment --- The percentage of students enrolled in career and technology courses at the center who earn a 2.0 or above on the final course grade.
- * Graduation Rate --- The percentage of 12th grade career and technology students who graduate in the spring.
- * Placement Rate --- The percentage of career and technology completers available for placement over a 3-year period who are actually placed in postsecondary instruction, military services, or employment.

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Report of Director and School Improvement Council

Anderson Districts I & II Career and Technology Center experienced a very successful 2011-12 school year. Approximately 2232 ninth, tenth, eleventh, and twelfth-grade students from Wren, Palmetto, Powdersville, and Belton-Honea Path High Schools were enrolled in career and technical training in 20 different programs. Some of our accomplishments for 2011-12 include: Students participated in 1149 school-to-work experiences. Students had 195 internships and 21 co-op's. 394 students were classified as Completers. 3 students from the Culinary Arts program won the State ServSafe Competition and competed in Baltimore on the National Level. The PLTW Engineering Robotics Team won the State Competition and completed in St. Louis on the National Level. 103 students were inducted in the Career and Technical Honor Society. Seniors in the Business Academy received Dual Credit through Tri-County Tech. 152 students from the Project Lead the Way courses are eligible to receive Dual Credit through the University of South Carolina, Piedmont Tech College, University of Iowa, and Rochester Institute of Technology. State licenses were awarded to 36 Certified Nursing Assistants, 17 Cosmetology students, 9 Finance Academy students, 16 Certified Law Enforcement Dispatching students, 13 Nail Technology students, 18 Esthetic students, 39 Hunter's Education students, 8 OSHA Certifications, 4 ServSafe Certifications, 2 ProStart National Certificate of Achievement, 2 1152 Fundamental of Firefighting certificates, 5 Emergency Medical Response Certifications, 16 American Welding Society Certifications and 212 CPR Certifications. 100 business and industry representatives served on 20 program advisory committees. 208 WorkKey Certificates were issued to seniors: 18 were Gold, 134 were Silver, and 56 were Bronze. Seniors received over \$300,000 in scholarship monies. With a student-centered focus, the administration, faculty, and staff strive for continuous improvement by providing an academically and technically challenging education for all students. Instructors align the curriculum with current workplace trends and apply academics in work-based situations. Community involvement from parents, businesses, industries, and local organization remains strong.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
