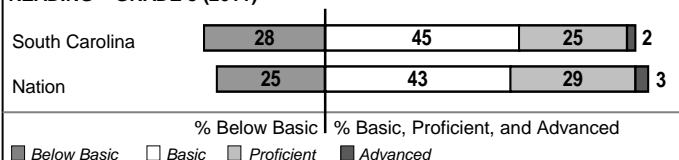

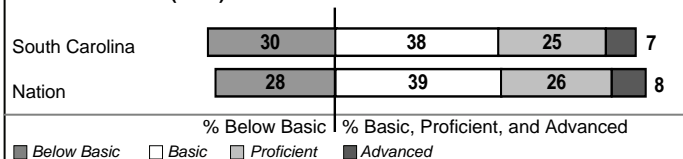

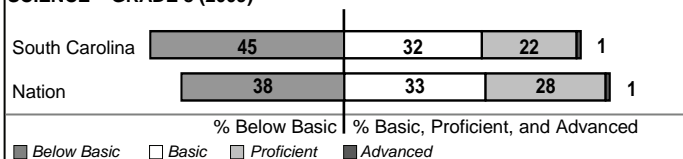
READING – GRADE 8 (2011)

REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Fairfield Career and Technology Center experienced a successful 2011-2012 school year. Our school met national and state standards for academic achievement, graduation rate, placement and non-traditional student retention. Students were successful in district, state and national competitive events. One student placed second in the state in Future Business Leaders of America competition and one student placed second in the state in Screen Printing for SkillsUSA. Our Graphics Communications teams placed third and fourth in the international competition of the Phoenix Challenge.

Among the numerous notable accomplishments of our students over the past year are the following: one hundred percent of our cosmetology students received the National Cosmetology License after passing the State Board theory and practical exams and completing the required number of hours; one hundred percent of our students who attempted received the National Certified Nursing Assistant's License; fifteen students are now certified in Work Keys, which will enhance their college applications and resumes for employment; nine new students were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society. Students at Fairfield Career and Technology Center participated in many service learning activities during the year, such as: catering, printing, building, and cosmetology services for the community. Our most rewarding service learning project for the 2011-2012 school year was that of leading the district's Relay for Life fundraiser for the American Cancer Society. This service learning project began with the Health Science Technology students and grew into a Fairfield County event. At the conclusion of this event, Fairfield County doubled the goal that was set by The American Cancer Society, with a final report of \$52,000.00.
