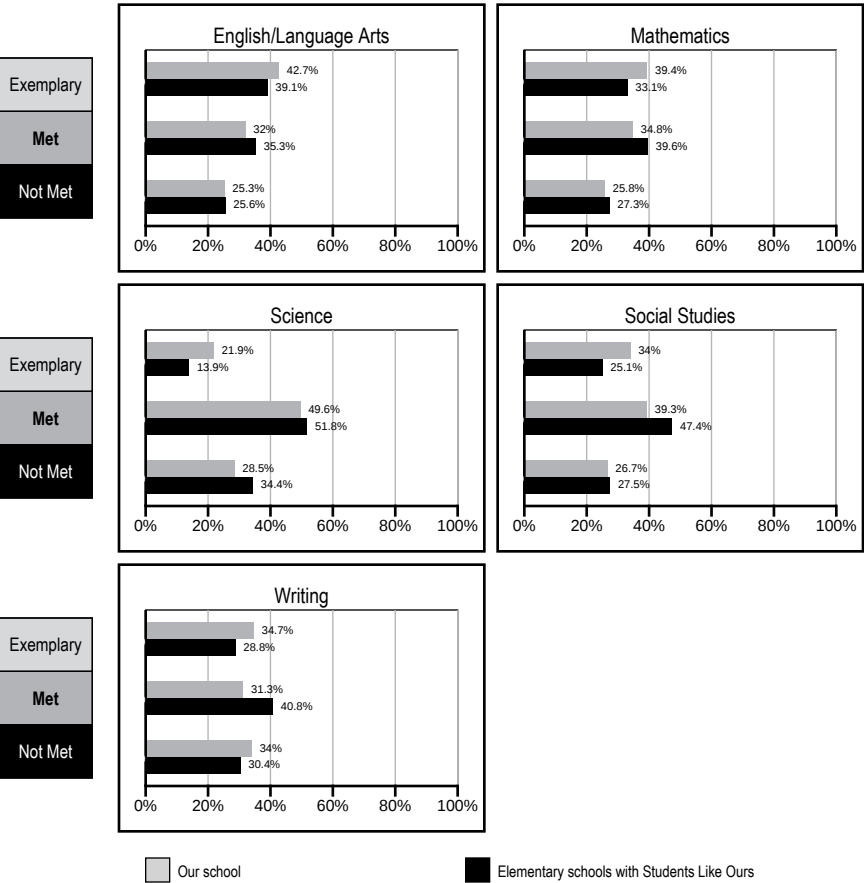

Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2011-2012 school term was stellar at Brockington Elementary Magnet School. Brockington, a Title I site, houses third through fifth grades and one Hearing Handicapped class, and lies just outside the city limits of Darlington. During the year, the school earned a Palmetto Silver Award; won two Darlington County Education Foundation Grants; had a teacher recognized with the Educator Award from the Chamber of Commerce; and had a student earn the district-level Art in Business Award. These forms of recognition motivated the school community to intensify efforts toward continuous academic improvement.

The School Improvement Council, in conjunction with the school faculty, created a plan to address areas of academic concern. This plan emphasized expanding classroom libraries; forming teaching teams at each grade level for science and social studies instruction; utilizing computer-assisted instruction directly correlated to long-range plans; providing professional development that focused on Explicit Direct Instruction; using reading and math interventionists to best support selected student needs; and instituting small-group related arts instructional sessions called Focus Groups.

Due to the initiatives that the school embarked upon in 2011-2012, formative assessments increased in importance. The responsive teaching cycle took on greater depth, through intensive item analysis followed by prescriptive, whole group, small group, and individual instruction. Student progress was closely studied, to insure that academic needs were being met.

Brockington provided additional opportunities and resources for students in 2011-2012. A motivational reading program, Hot Dog Readers, was funded for fifth grade students. School-based technology purchases skyrocketed with the acquisition of sixty Nook e-readers; a mobile lab of 30 net book computers; and an IPOD lab. The school also matched funds to purchase a kiln. The school celebrated and honored student success whenever possible with incentives, awards, and ceremonies.

Parental and community support continued to impact Brockington in 2011-2012 as well. The PTO worked successfully on a long list of school-level projects and networked with the community. This collaboration resulted in contributions including landscaping, furnishings, and student incentives. The school also continued to enjoy a relationship with the amazing volunteers from Macedonia Baptist Church. The collective efforts of the Brockington School community truly helped make the school year wonderful and helped our students thrive in many ways.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
