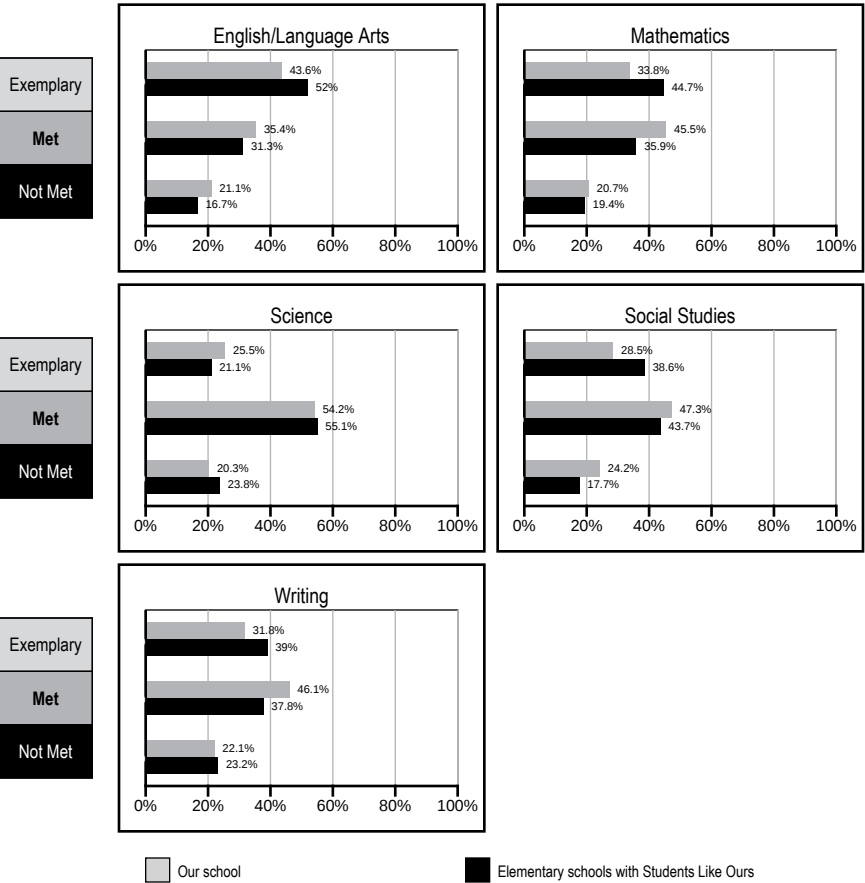

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2011-2012 school year at Moore Intermediate began with the establishment of three goals: first, to reach the highest levels of academic excellence, next to improve parent and community relations and finally to establish a culture whereas students would always look back on their experience at Moore as something uniquely special. Moore Intermediate's teachers represent the very best and brightest in education. Their dedication to student success led to another year as a Palmetto Silver Award recipient. Teachers at Moore also engaged in a variety of professional development. Moore Intermediate had the highest number of teachers participate in the Crisis Prevention Intervention training held by the district office. Moore Intermediate was also named a "Champion of the Environment" by DHEC. We were the only school in the Pee Dee to gain that designation. Moore continues to excel in the area of technology, this year adding Nooks to the media center. Moore Intermediate made huge strides in the area of parent and community relations. Spearheaded by an extremely active APT, the school provided numerous opportunities for parents to actively participate in the education of their children. Some of the events included the Math Carnival, Read With Someone You Love Night, Family Fun Night, lunch in the butterfly garden, Grandparents' Day, Family Night at the June Lane Community Center, Moore Night at Skateland USA and many others. We were also very proud of some of the partnerships we formed this year. General Electric came out for a workday at Moore and made significant improvements to our building and grounds. We also had parents help teach in our Math Club. Area churches also proved beneficial as they served as sponsors for our Good News Club as well as mentors to our students. Moore continued its pursuit of encouraging good citizenship through Jump Rope/Hoops for Heart, Pennies for Pasta, area park cleanups, the Adopt-A-Child Program, and a district canned food drive (Moore was the top contributor). Moore made a very deliberate effort to recognize students this year in a push to instill lasting memories for our students. Students were recognized for their academic achievement each nine weeks during an award's day program as well as rewarded with a pep rally for good behavior. Teachers were able to nominate students of the month each month and those students had breakfast with the principal. Moore continued to serve as an example in the area of extra-curricular activities. We offered a variety of clubs to include Chorus, Lego, Robotics, Good News, SAVE, Horizons, Environmental, Math and Drama. We at Moore Intermediate are very proud of our school and look forward to another successful year.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
