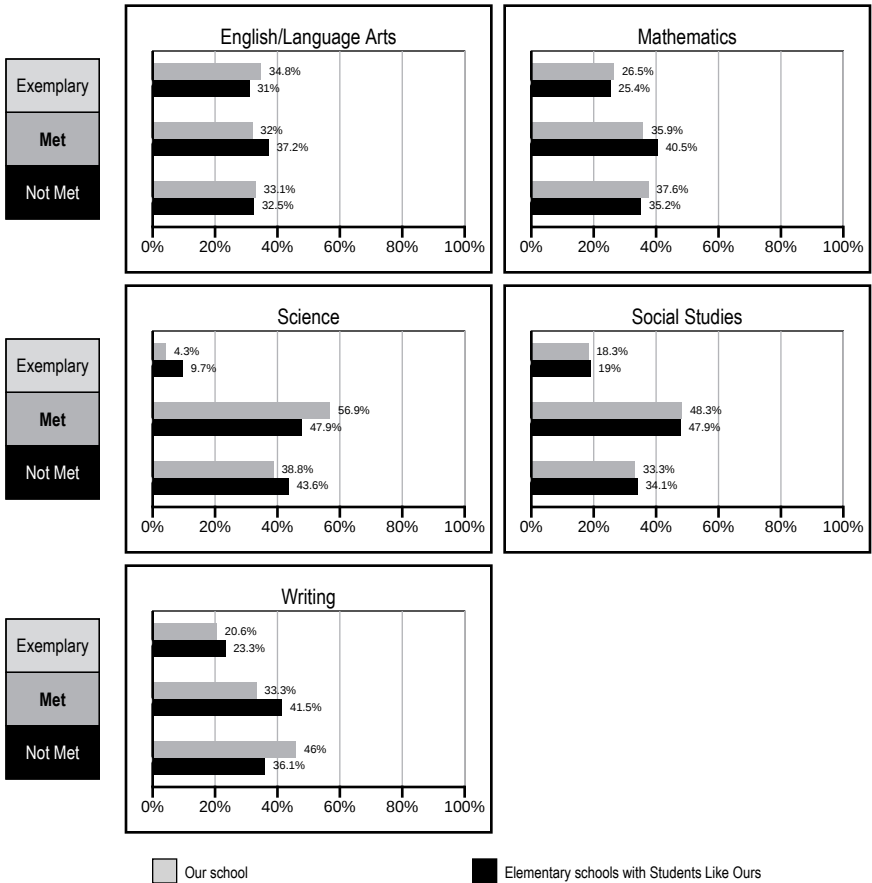

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Scranton Elementary School continued to strive towards excellence during the 2011-2012 school year where our mission is to educate all children by achieving academic success. SES served 422 students in grades pre-K through fifth grade, where we offered a positive and safe environment so students could grow and learn.

Although we did not make AYP, meeting only 13 out of 17 objectives, our faculty and staff provided educational experiences that addressed the individual needs of each child.

Our students were provided numerous opportunities with hands-on learning, a year long reading challenge, Door Buster Morning Program, After-school program, Spanish lessons daily on the Morning Show and interactive technology used in instruction. Technology programs used were Classworks, First in Math, Reading Counts, Fast ForWord, and RAZ Kids. Individual student needs were met through researched based strategies, small group instruction and benchmark testing to ensure academic growth.

Our character education program provided opportunities for our students to develop character traits throughout the year. A bullying program was also implemented to help ensure a safe environment for students to learn and become successful individuals in a community of learners. SES students were involved in several community service projects: March of Dimes, Pennies for Patients, the Florence County Disabilities Helping Hands Project and Food Bank, and American Red Cross Hero Campaign. This allowed our students to take responsibility in helping others and instilled a sense of pride and caring into their lives.

The school leadership team met with teachers to analyze data from PASS, MAP and benchmark tests to plan instruction and assessments based on the South Carolina Standards. The teachers were trained in instructional strategies for ELA and Math during cluster meetings with a Master Teacher. Monthly technology professional development was provided by the district technology coaches on a monthly basis. A professional book study on strategies to engage students in active learning was held during the school year.

Family and community partnership was maintained through Open House, Family Nights, Grandparents' Day, Doughnuts for Dads, Muffins for Moms, Fall Festival, Pass Celebration Day, Field Day, Author's Tea, Arts Day and conferences.

Scranton Elementary School continues to make every effort to meet the needs of all our students. As partners with our students, their families, and our community, we are making a difference everyday in the lives of our children.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
