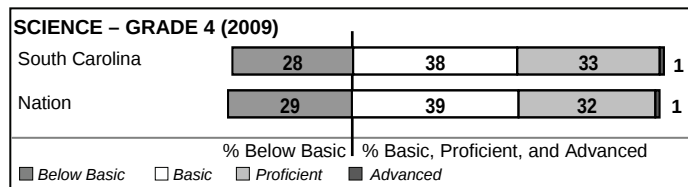
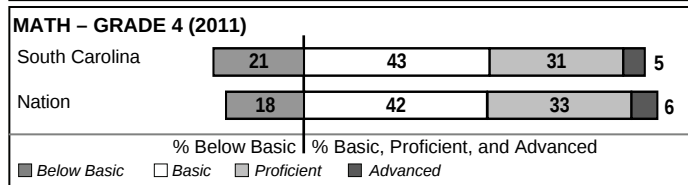
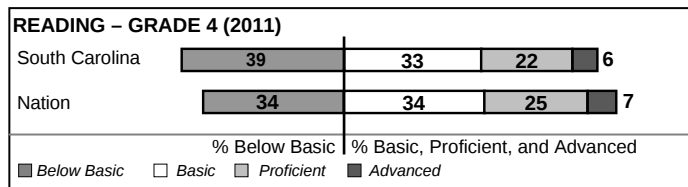
PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Seaside Elementary School is a family centered school that celebrates the triumphs and successes of our students and staff as well as support each other in times of need. Stingrays Strive for Excellence was the theme for the 2011-12 school year. Students, staff, parents and community members worked together to achieve our goal of fostering successful life-long learners. During the school year, we all worked together to develop a School Renewal Plan that will help guide our school programs for the next five years. The use of a core reading program continued in Pre-K-3 and was extended to include fourth grade. DIBELS information guided instruction for kindergarten and first grade students and the MAP assessment supported differentiation for students in grades two through five. Small group interventions were provided to the students throughout the school day in reading, math, and writing. The use of workstations continued to support our reading instruction. To accelerate mathematical problem solving skills, selected students in grades 3-5 participated in the Mentoring Mathematical Minds program. Leveled instruction in math was also provided for students in grades 3-5. Selected fifth grade students participated in the Math Olympiad program and an on-line pre-algebra program. The use of instructional technology has been enhanced with the addition of Smart boards in all classrooms and Student Response Systems for each grade level. Many extensive activities were planned to support student learning in all grade levels at Seaside. The PTO and a grant from Target extended our Family Reading Night to a weekly program where parents and students read books together, took Accelerated Reader tests, and used the computers for research, reinforcement or enrichment. Students were selected to provide leadership in our school through our Junior Safety Patrol, Student Council and the Spirit Team programs. Our fifth grade chorus performed concerts in our school and in our community. To enhance our students' understanding of community and school interactions, all classes were involved in Junior Achievement. Sixty fifth grade students participated in our Junior Lifeguard Program. Students also participated in many service-learning projects including the Family Fun Run, Relay for Life, Fostering Hope, a Thanksgiving Food Drive, a Food Drive for Homeless Animals, Jump Rope for Heart, and a school-wide Recycling program. Throughout the school year, staff members met to plan and exchange ideas to improve classroom instruction and implement district initiatives. All teachers were involved in professional development, which helped us meet the diverse needs of our students.
