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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

South Florence High School soared to success during the 2011-2012 school year. Our students and faculty members received numerous awards and accolades as they participated in a variety of educational and extra-curricular activities. As recipients of the SC School Climate Initiative Grant, Students Managing Alternative Responses and Thoughts (SMART grant), SFHS focused on building relationships and making responsible choices by engaging in community outreach and increasing student recognition. Student recognitions focused on student behaviors of valuing learning, respecting self and others and demonstrating citizenship. Recognitions included "Caught Doing Something Good," 98% or better attendance, and no-discipline.

The class of 2012 earned over \$7,677,000 in scholarship offers to include 93 Life Scholars, 8 Palmetto Fellows recipients, 3 SC Board of Education Academic Achievement awardees, and 1 Air Force Academy appointee. 2012 graduates were presented with opportunities to attend the following institutions: USC-Columbia, Presbyterian College, Clemson University, Coker College, Francis Marion University, Newberry College, Lander University, Charleston Southern University, Coastal Carolina, Claflin University, Furman, South Carolina State, USC Aiken, Florence-Darlington Technical College, and Spartanburg Methodist. Of the 2012 graduating class, 85% plan on attending a two or four year college and 57% worked diligently to obtain single cord (125), double cord (48) and Board of Trustee (18) honors. All of our graduates worked hard to obtain their diplomas and we are proud to have shared in helping them succeed.

Student recognition for 2011-2012 included: 2011 Youth in Government Premiere Delegation and Outstanding Appeals Attorney. SFHS students also excelled in athletics as they participated in varsity and junior varsity sports to include volleyball, football, cross country, swimming, tennis, basketball, cheerleading, golf, track, soccer, softball, and baseball. Varsity Football, Boys' Basketball, and Girls' Softball teams all made it to the 2nd round of the playoffs. And for the third consecutive year, SFHS was awarded the district's All Sports Trophy for having the best head-to-head record against other FSD1 schools.

SFHS's work to provide meaningful learning opportunities for all learners in the building continued as teachers participated in collaborative goals to promote students achievement. Students took part in dance, orchestra, chorus, visual arts, band, music appreciation and drama courses. In partnership with Florence Darlington Technical College, 49 juniors and seniors completed 120 dual-credit courses. Students who passed the HSAP participated in a celebration recognizing their achievement and many students served their community and the world by participating in Relay for Life, Hero Benefits, and the annual Mix-it-Up Day. We will continue to strive for excellence as we look forward to next year's successes.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
