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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

This has been an exciting year at Johnsonville High School. The credit to our success goes to our outstanding students who have the support of a great community and school staff that continues to offer them a great learning environment. Our motto continues to be "Raising the Bar" in hopes to encourage us to approach new ideas with great enthusiasm and to continue the academic and athletic success that has made Johnsonville High School the "Pride of the Pee Dee."

Of the Class of 2012, sixty-one percent were awarded state scholarships in the amount of \$1,495,800 with four of these students being awarded the prestigious Palmetto Fellows Scholarship for outstanding academic achievement. Academically, the school received the "Palmetto Gold Award" from the State Department of Education for excellent results in closing the achievement gaps. The school also received an "excellent" rating on the school report card. During the 2011-2012 school year, we have put a huge emphasis on literacy and have seen a remarkable increase in the amount of books our have read. Additionally, the Math Team won the Williamsburg Technical College "Einstein" Math Competition for the third year in a row, and the Academic Challenge team was named runner up in the Pee Dee Region Tournament.

The sports teams continue to excel at Johnsonville High School. This year the boy's basketball team won region and lower state championships and was state runner-up. The school also won region championships in Volleyball, Boys' Basketball, JV Softball, Varsity Softball, JV Baseball, Varsity Baseball, and Girls' Track.

Johnsonville is very proud to have ten teachers on staff who have received their National Board Certification. This continues to be one of the highest percentages in the state. Currently, we have three teachers on staff who have received the Presidential Award of Excellence in Math and Science. In addition, three of our teachers have been recognized as Honor Roll teachers for the State of South Carolina. We are also very proud and honored to be home of the 2012 South Carolina State Teacher of the Year, Mrs. Amy McAllister-Skinner.

Johnsonville High School exists in order to help each student to develop their fullest potential and reach their optimum intellectual, physical, aesthetic, moral, and social development. The school's curriculum provides opportunities for frequent and varied student participation in school events, with adjustments being made according to the individual abilities and needs of the students. Likewise, in accordance with the State Department of Education mandates, our courses curriculum has been correlated with the state standards.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
