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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

At the end of every school year, the School Improvement Council and the administration of Camden High School is charged with writing a report to the community detailing the accomplishments of the school throughout the past year. It has been a great year at CHS; we finally opened and dedicated our Spring Sports complex including our 8 lane track. CHS, for the first time in recent history hosted our region track meet. We also begin our Freshman Transition Program and instituted Leadership CHS classes. Our First time HSAP test takers improved from 73.7% to 81.3% in Math and English for 84.6% to 89.7%. Our 4 year graduation rate is 89.0% while our five year graduation rate is 96.0%.

The 2011/2012 school year has been a year filled with accomplishments and recognition for our faculty, staff, and school:

- 1 CHS student won the Clemson University Biology Bowl Competition. While she and another student were named in the top 10% of all students participating in the competition
- CHS Athletics continued its proud tradition with Region Championships in Volleyball, Boy's and Girl's Tennis, and Boy's and Girl's Soccer.
- One CHS student was named the Daughters of the American Revolution county contest winner.
- Our Academic Booster Club donated 6 scholarships to worthy students. They were able to provide this through strong fundraising efforts and their continued leadership.
- Our Kappa League program has welcomed 17 students into its ranks.
- CHS had 10 Palmetto Fellows scholarship winners.
- The Camden High School family continued their commitment to giving back to our community by performing numerous service learning, and fund-raising projects including: over \$10,000 for Relay for Life, over \$13,000 for United Way, countless service hours to our community through Adopt-a-Highway, Habitat for Humanity, and others. Bulldogs give back!
- Our graduating class had 35 Distinguished honor graduates, 32 Honor graduates and 43 SC Academic Honors Medal Recipients.
- 11 Seniors were named to the Upchuch & Jowers All-County Academic Team
- Mrs. Molly Moxley was named the LEMS Teacher of the Year and Mrs. Rebecca Rundlett was named the CHs and Kershaw County's Reading Teacher of the Year.
- CHS opened its new Aquaponics lab increasing student opportunity for hands-on instruction.
- 2 students had their art projects chosen for the Fine Arts Center's County Talent Show.
- 1 CHS senior was named the WLTX Player of the Week.
- CHS Students donated over 2000 hours of community service.
- Mrs. Courtney Hill's website was recognized by E-Chalk as being an Exemplary homepage.
- The Camden High Concert Band scored an Excellent rating at Concert Festival.
- 4 CHS Band students scored Superior at Solo and Ensemble competition.

This has been an exciting year for Camden High School. One of our goals was to be recognized as a leader in Secondary education in our state. We continue to take strides towards that goal this year. Our congratulations go out to the partnership between our students, parents, and staff which make Camden High School the great school that it is.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
