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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Swansea High Freshman Academy serves approximately 250 students in grade 9. "Ensuring Student Performance at the Highest Level" is our motto and drives our mission to establish high standards by creating a learning environment which ensures student performance at the highest level. As a professional learning community, SHFA is very cognizant of learning, collaboration and results to continue a cycle for improvement. The professional learning community of SHFA significantly decreased the retention rate for 9th grade students in Lexington School District 4. In 2010-2011 the retention rate decreased from 33 percent to 12 percent. The 2011-2012 school year was another successful year. The retention rate for 9th grade decreased another 3 percent and is currently at 9 percent.

SHFA is also a "Project Lead the Way" school. Students have reaped benefits of our engineering class with high levels of engagement, rigor, relevance, creativity and fun. Student involvement is a key indicator for student success. SHFA was well represented in many extracurricular endeavors during the 2011-2012 school year. Forty-six percent of the student population was enrolled in the JROTC program, which was recognized as an honor unit of distinction. Forty-three percent of the student population is involved in athletics. These students contributed to the region championships in football, baseball and wrestling. The band and chorus program was represented by 61 students from the academy. The marching band received a 3rd place at the AAA Lower State Championship and a 6th place at the AAA State Championship. One student was selected to the Region 2 Honor Band. The jazz combo band received a superior rating at the State Jazz Festival and the symphonic band received an excellent rating at the State Concert Festival. The chorus program also received an excellent rating at the State Choral Festival.

Our teachers and staff are working to create effective professional learning communities within our school. We continue to focus on our own learning to provide the highest quality instruction for our students. Teams of teachers meet weekly to discuss curriculum and assessment to determine our next instructional steps for each child. Challenges and priorities ahead for our school community include focusing on students' individual learning and providing all students with academic support through appropriate interventions. We will continue to target literacy and to provide opportunities for authentic reading and writing in all areas. SHFA and the School Improvement Council have worked hard to improve stakeholder performance, communication and collaboration. We look forward to working with future stakeholders to make our school the best it can be.
