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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

This school year marked Nation Ford High School's 5th year anniversary. In just a short period of time, the staff and students have demonstrated a commitment to excellence in academics, athletics, and the arts. Our faculty and staff strive to maximize every student's potential by ensuring a relevant, viable curriculum and high quality instruction. The 2011-2012 school year has been a successful year for the Falcons. The average SAT school score increased by 25 points to an overall composite score of 1592. Advanced Placement enrollment has increased by 21%, and almost 400 exams were administered in May. The growth of our AP program greatly impacted the Fort Mill School District being named an AP Honor Roll District with the College Board. Our enthusiasm and commitment to helping students earn college credit was evidenced by NFHS being name South Carolina AP Day Champions! In March 2012, The South Carolina Department of Education awarded NFHS the Palmetto Gold Award for 2011-2012. NFHS was recognized for both General Performance and Closing the Achievement Gap. This accomplishment is attributed to our teacher's hard work and a commitment to better meeting the needs of all students, particularly those performing below grade level. Identifying students in the spring of their 8th grade year and enrolling them into an SRA reading program and selected year-long English and math classes upon arrival to the high school is crucial to early high school success and to reducing drop-out rates. As we continue to push all students to be college ready, the at-risk students still remain a priority to our staff. Many of our students demonstrated excellence in extra-curricular activities as well. The fall and winter sports seasons ended with two individual state titles--one in swimming and the other in wrestling. Several athletic teams earned region championships and went on to compete at the next level. The girls and boys tennis teams even competed for the AAA state title. Even though they both fell short, we are still very proud of them and their very successful season. Our fine arts programs continue to grow and succeed. The Marching Band won the AAA State Championship and demonstrated their exceptional talent and skills in the 2012 Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City. They were on the "big screen" and represented our great state wonderfully! Lastly, our year concluded with a memorable graduation ceremony! We awarded 357 diplomas, and anticipate 90% of those graduates to pursue a post-secondary education this fall. The class of 2012 earned over \$4,000,000 in scholarships, with 30 graduates qualifying for Palmetto Fellows, 145 for LIFE, and 238 for HOPE Scholarships. We are very proud of them and wish them much success and happiness in their future endeavors!

This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
