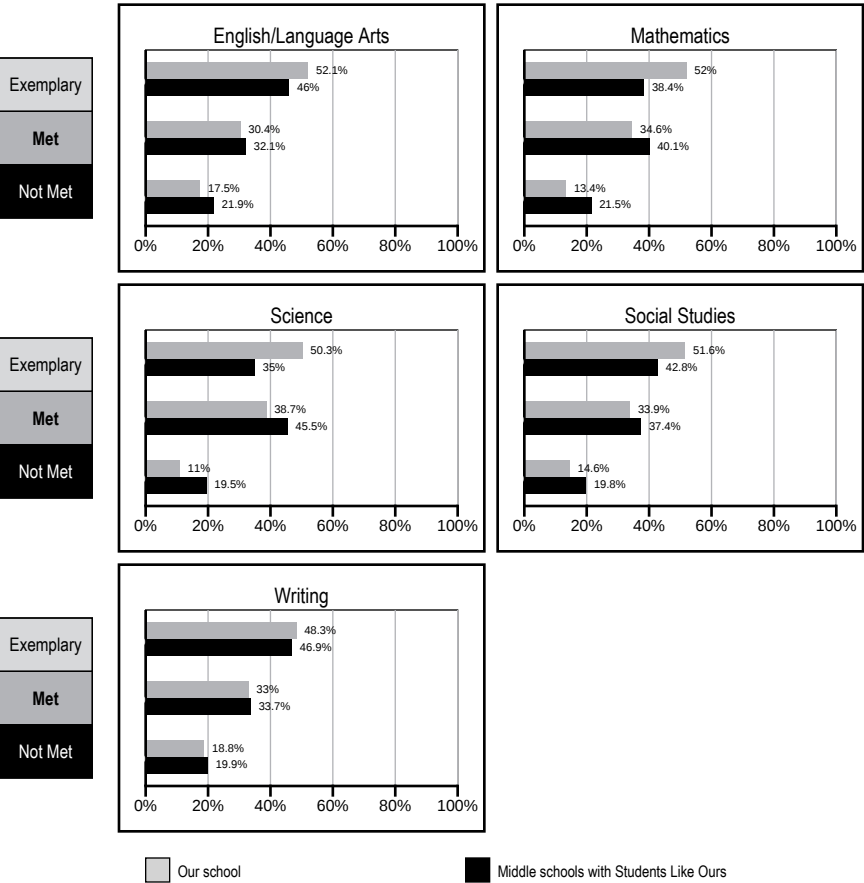

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The 2011-2012 School Year has been a year of excitement and success for the faculty, staff and students of Ocean Bay Middle School. We are proud of the many achievements experienced at Ocean Bay Middle School in our sixth year. The community has provided support and continued assistance to our students and staff. It is with great pride and pleasure that we share the many accomplishments of Ocean Bay Middle with our parents, staff, community and students. Ocean Bay Middle is proud of being awarded, "Palmetto Gold for Achievement". This year OBM is proud of the 31 Junior Scholars, 29 Explore Scholars and 5 Duke Tip Scholars. OBMS was recognized by The Horry Environmental Action Team as the recipient of the "The Heat is On" award. OBMS celebrated and participated in many events, activities, competitions, accomplishments, and new opportunities throughout the year: Reading is strongly promoted throughout the year through: Café at the Bay, author visits, Book Fairs, Reading across America, participation in World Record for pages read by a school, and events of reading as a focus. Fifty members of our Science Club swam with the Manatees in Florida as adventure learning. The Studio Production Club produced the news everyday to increase communication to our staff and students. This year the number of Fine Arts All-County participants from Ocean Bay Middle was impressive with 6 All-County Orchestra, 1 All-Region, 1 All State Orchestra (1st Chair), 15 All-county Chorus, 14 All-County Band, 7 for All-Region, and 1 All-State, and of 51 Solo and Ensemble Band Members 29 received Superior ratings and 19 Excellent. Students performed "Aladdin" for the school production. The Black History Program "Spreading the Spirit of Love" was a tremendous success focusing on ethnicities, and better tolerance between different races. An Occupational "Vehicle" Career Day with several community participants was held in which students rotated to each career represented. Virtual Job Shadowing participants, The "Good News Card" and the "Staff and Student of the Month" programs continue to recognize and celebrate the achievements, kind acts and contributions of students and staff. Community service and Character Education were focuses for OBM and we are proud of the many successes in this area: the fall Leadership Class raised \$2,500.00 for Collin's Kids-ATV Safety Awareness Program, the spring Leadership Class raised \$2000.00 for Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Guidance Dept. and the Finance Class raised money for needy families for the holiday fundraiser. The 7th & 8th Band traveled to Washington D.C. to perform at The Navel Memorial. OBM students participated in track, cross-country, basketball, baseball, football, golf, tennis, volleyball, cheerleading wrestling and soccer at the middle school level and at both the Junior Varsity and Varsity level. OBM recognizes Alpha/Beta academic recipients quarterly and this year awarded 2340 awards to Alpha/Beta students. In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
