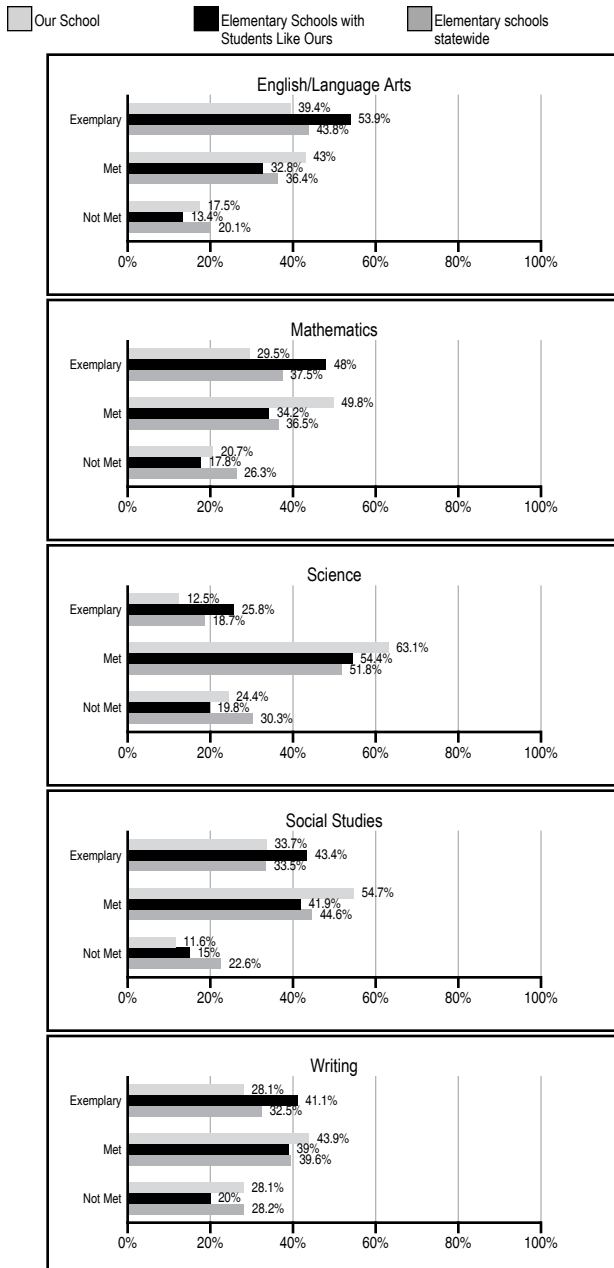

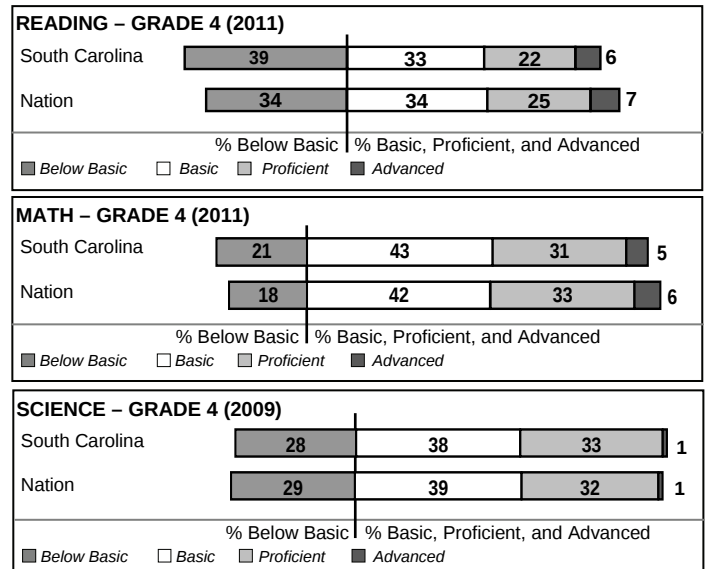

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, then, is not an act, but a habit. (Aristotle)

At the outset of the 2012-13 school year, the Polo Road family made a commitment to pursuing EXCELLENCE. Using the theme, Excellence in Every Endeavor, we ventured to make EXCELLENCE a habit. Our unrelenting pursuit yielded a myriad of positive outcomes, including ...

Excellence in School, Home & Community Relations: We improved upon existing programs and services. For example, we expanded the scope of our new family induction process to include offering an orientation in the spring semester (in addition to the session already offered in the fall semester) and posting pictures of new students on a bulletin board to help us with learning not just their faces, but their names, too. We also hosted a Family Literacy Night which provided parents an opportunity to learn strategies to facilitate their children's interest and growth in reading. Additionally, a "Try This at Home" column was featured in our weekly newsletters, providing families with fun, content-related activities to work on at home.

Excellence in Professional Development: Our certified and classified employees participated in professional development experiences. The topics explored included, student engagement, assessment, Common Core Standards, literacy, technology and customer service. As no learning is complete without a field study, our faculty and staff participated in a variety of them. Visits to and collaboration with colleagues from other Richland 2 schools, a visit to Kensington Mansion and an in-house idea swap were among the field studies that enriched our faculty/staff's professional learning.

Excellence in Patriotism: Polo Road was very fortunate to have been the recipient of a grant by the Department of Defense. The grant was used to fund eighteen field studies, technological equipment and professional development experiences. Receiving the DoD grant ignited a new level of patriotism in our school. Students participated in a variety of Veterans Day activities, a mock presidential election and Purple Up Day – a day of honoring military children for the sacrifices they make as a result of their parent(s) serving in the armed forces. Our annual field day was military-themed complete with performances by the very talented Army Band.

Additionally, we are very pleased to: (1) have been named a recipient of another Palmetto Silver Award; (2) have hosted student teachers and practicum students from Columbia College, the University of South Carolina, Columbia International University and Claflin University; and (3) be the home school of the State winner of the D.A.R.E. Essay Contest.

Polo Road's successes are a result of the participation and engagement of motivated students, parents, faculty/staff and community members. We are unwavering in our commitment to continuous improvement.
