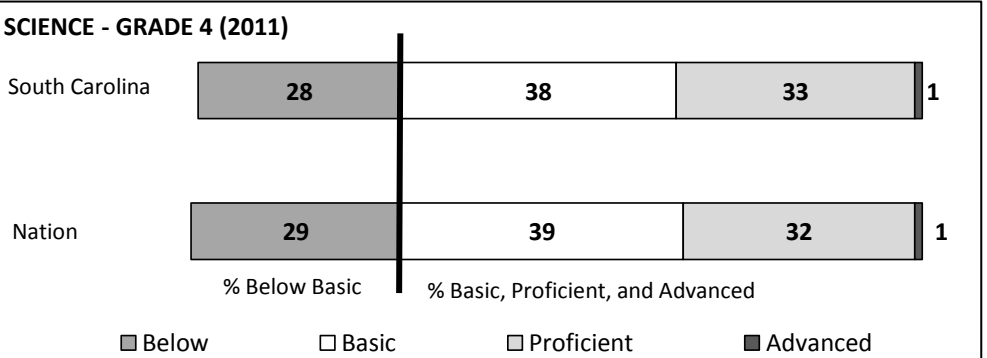

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Whitesville Elementary serves students in Head Start through 5th grade. The school is located in a high growth area between Moncks Corner and Goose Creek. Our enrollment this year remained stable, with a student body of 1,050. We are a Title 1 school which allows us to receive additional funding from the Federal government to support student academic success. Our staff continues to strive to provide our students with many varied opportunities to excel.

Our students and parents saw an instructional shift in the instructional expectations, strategies and materials used in the classroom. Our teachers worked diligently to assess student knowledge and teach to individual student needs. This shift will have our students better prepared for college and the workforce. One such notable shift was the number of non-fiction books that students read. We increased our library circulation of non-fiction books over 25%. Individual student needs were met through the implementation of various programs that included hiring an interventionist with our Title 1 funds to work with small groups to address areas of weakness. We participated in the District’s technology initiative, purchasing over 120 IPADS for students to use in the classroom. Coupled with the 4 computer labs in our school, students have access to software to address students’ strengths and weakness. Teachers also use this technology to enhance lessons and ensure that all students remain engaged. Our Title 1 funds supported the funding of two instructional coaches. They support teachers in their professional growth, learning how to better meet individual student needs.

Our school offers a number of activities outside the classroom. We have a chorus and art club. Several of our students excelled to the All County Chorus. Many of our students’ visual artworks were on display at venues across the Tri-County. We have a morning WES News show which is led by our 4th and 5th grade students.

We have wonderful parent/volunteer participation at Whitesville. They support our teachers and staff in a variety of ways. The opportunities ranges from helping out at the Father/Daughter dance, serving on the School Improvement Council, serving as a PTO board member, helping answer phones, covering lunchroom duty for teachers, going on field trips, and making bulletin boards. We love our volunteers! Our business partners support Whitesville. BP Fabric of America and TCB Corporation funded our arts program during the 2013-14 school year. We also received funds from sponsoring nights at McDonalds, Sonic, and Dominos. Whitesville also gives back to the community through our Jump Rope For Heart, where we donate to the American Heart Association. Our staff also donates to the local children’s shelter, Callen Lacey.

We are proud of our students’ and staff’s successes and community support and look forward to the 2014-15 school year.
