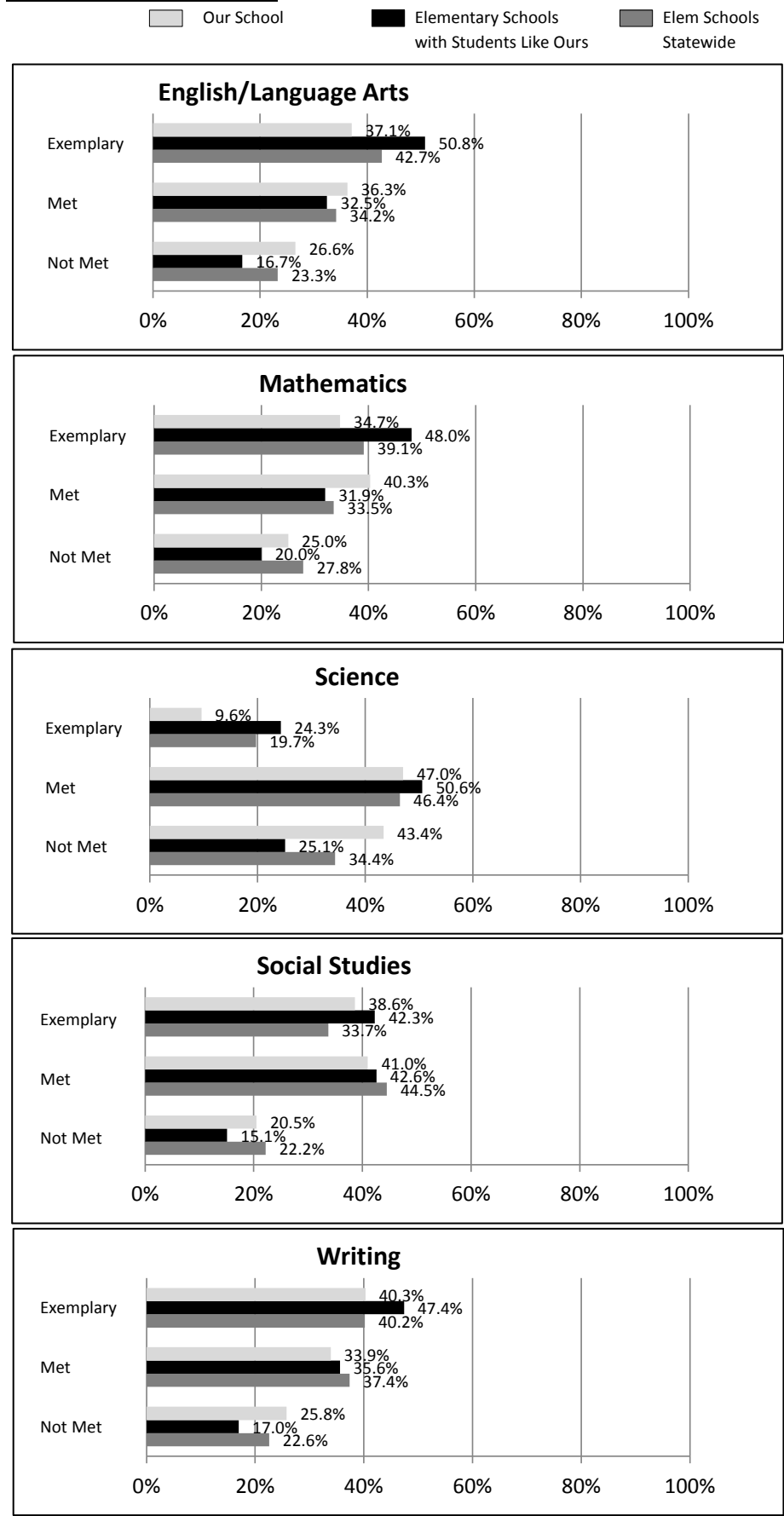

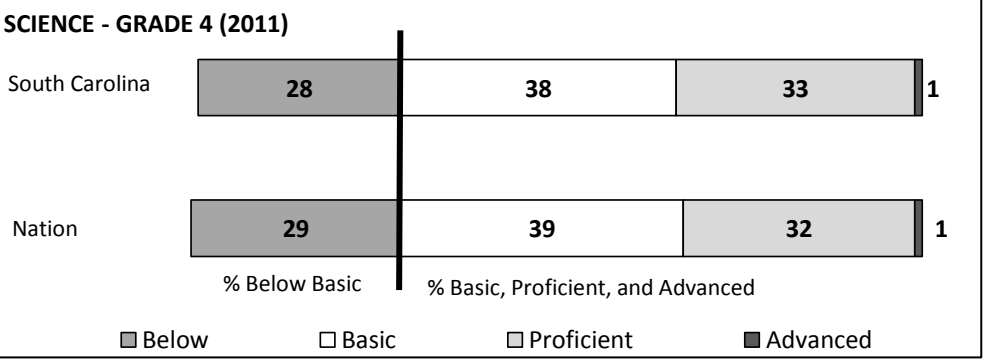

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The Academy successfully establishes a learning environment that promotes optimal learning. The school’s mission values each child and faculty member as an individual and strives to provide support and encouragement that ensures that all members of the school family reach academic and social success. The Academy’s faculty and staff are reviewing the school’s charter to reflect and build new goals with strategies for implementation of “best practices” for academic and social success. The faculty and staff meet weekly to read and grow professionally. The professional learning community of the school examines current educational research to continue to grow in current educational practices. The Academy sets goals to focus heavily on professional development and reflection on student progress that promotes academic and social excellence.❏

The Academy continues to implement a systematic approach to gathering student data from various sources (PASS, MAP, formal and informal assessments, and interest inventories) to determine academic remediation and acceleration opportunities. Staff members use the results from the data to reflect on their teaching practices and search for various strategies to reach all learners. Students are provided an additional hour of instruction each day during the school’s extended day program. PASS and MAP data indicate a positive impact on student achievement.❏

The Academy establishes a strong sense of community for all the students who attend the school. Weekly gatherings are held on Fridays that showcase students’ learning and recognize “Students of the Week”, perfect attendance, Honor Roll and “Mighty Mustang Awards” for strong character. The Academy continues to involve every student in service learning projects that help the community. The school has made a commitment to fight hunger in our community with several food drives to stock the local food pantry. Kindergarten and first grade students plant and maintain a vegetable garden that also provides fresh vegetables to the local food bank. The school also participates in Relay for Life and Pennies for Patients. The school implements the components of the Heartwood Character Education curriculum for students. Students, faculty and parents recommend individuals for “Mighty Mustang” awards that display outstanding character traits. The Academy celebrates “Peace Day” with activities that promote peace in our school, community, state and world. Each year, the school honors veterans and local emergency personnel with a “Patriot’s Day” celebration that focuses on thanking individuals for their service to our community and the world. ❏

Students are given a variety of extra-curricular activities during the school’s extended day program and during regular school hours. Students have the opportunity to participate in 4-H activities, Academy Student Council, YMCA swimming lessons, band, strings, cheerleading, drama, dance and debate. Each nine weeks, students are given a survey to determine opportunities for enrichment activities. ❏

Parent involvement continues to drive the school’s mission and support faculty and students. Parents are an active component of the success of the school. Parents serve as board members to govern the school and participate on committees that promote student success. Parent involvement is very evident in all areas of the school. The school holds an Academic Festival that involves parents in celebrating their child’s academic success.
