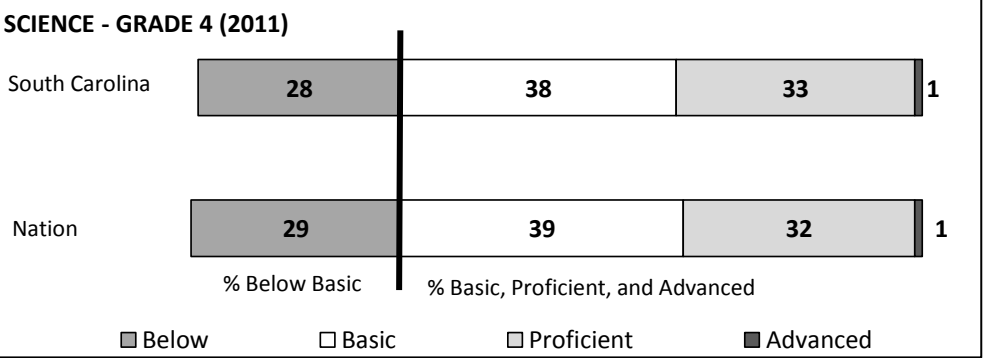

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The mission of Hodges Elementary School is to provide all students with a quality education that promotes responsible life-long learning to become self-reliant citizens. The Hodges Elementary School Family has worked to continue this mission during the 2013-2014 school year.

Teachers participated in professional development during the summer and throughout the school year to improve their inquiry and authentic engagement planning skills. Lessons were designed to develop inquisitive and expressive students who contributed to their school and community as they achieved their individual goals.

Our School Improvement Council and PTO supported many family activities and we had many volunteers who regularly assisted in our school. A partial list of activities included Birthday Lunches, Grandparent’s Day, PBIS Celebrations, Teacher and Bus Driver Appreciations, Curriculum Nights (ESOL and English), Terrific Kid Recognitions, Field Day, and the Hodges Has Talent Showcase.

The Hodges Elementary School Family also participated in fundraisers for the United Way, the American Cancer Society, the March of Dimes, and other non-profit organizations. We exceeded our goals during all campaigns.

Hodges Elementary School has completed our third year of the Greenwood School of Inquiry Initiative. We continued to embrace authentic investigations and project-based learning in ELA, Math, Social Studies, Science, Art, Music, and PE. Research, data, and technology were used as primary learning tools. We have expanded our technology capabilities and the latest technology tools to accommodate our growing generation of learners. Technology will continue to be a major focus for teaching and learning.
