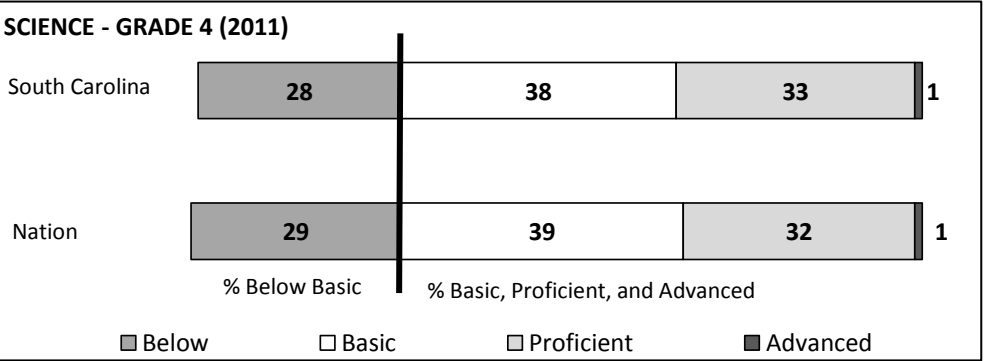

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Lexington Elementary School celebrated another successful year of learning in 2013-2014. The S.C. Department of Education recognized LES with a Palmetto Gold Award for general performance and a state grade of 86.2 (B) for performance exceeding state expectations.

LES served approximately 700 students in 4-year-old kindergarten through fifth grade and two classes of self-contained students with disabilities. We increased levels of academic excellence for all students by providing state standards based core instruction and a full range of related arts, media services and counseling.

We provided extracurricular activities such as Cats’ Choir, band, strings, Run Hard teams, Mad Science, reading incentive programs, computer-assisted mathematics instruction, and Gifted and Talented instruction. Students could also take part in service-learning activities such as Relay For Life, United Way, Palmetto Health Children’s Hospital “Happy Wheels Program” and Lexington Interfaith Community Service.

Lexington Elementary’s strength lies in outstanding student achievement and wonderful community involvement. Eighty-three percent of our students in grades two through five scored at the “proficient” level on Measures of Academic Progress in reading, while 85 percent scored “proficient” in mathematics. LES was recognized as the number one school in our state and district in First in Math. Grades two, three and five were ranked number one in South Carolina.

Our school’s continual challenge is to ensure that all students demonstrate competency in reading, mathematics, science, social studies and problem-solving strategies, attend school regularly and demonstrate 21st century qualities of responsibility, caring and respectful citizenship.

Staff participated in professional development by preparing for full implementation of the common core state standards. We also began exploration of the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme. We emphasized instructional rigor and high expectations for students by offering them the support they need to become capable thinkers and learners. Staff received grants from Project Unify, Bright Ideas and the Michelin Golden Apple Awards program.

Our PTA purchased new headphones for our computer labs and provided financial support for our instructional programs, field trip transportation and staff appreciation events. Thank you for your continued support and for allowing us to serve your children.
