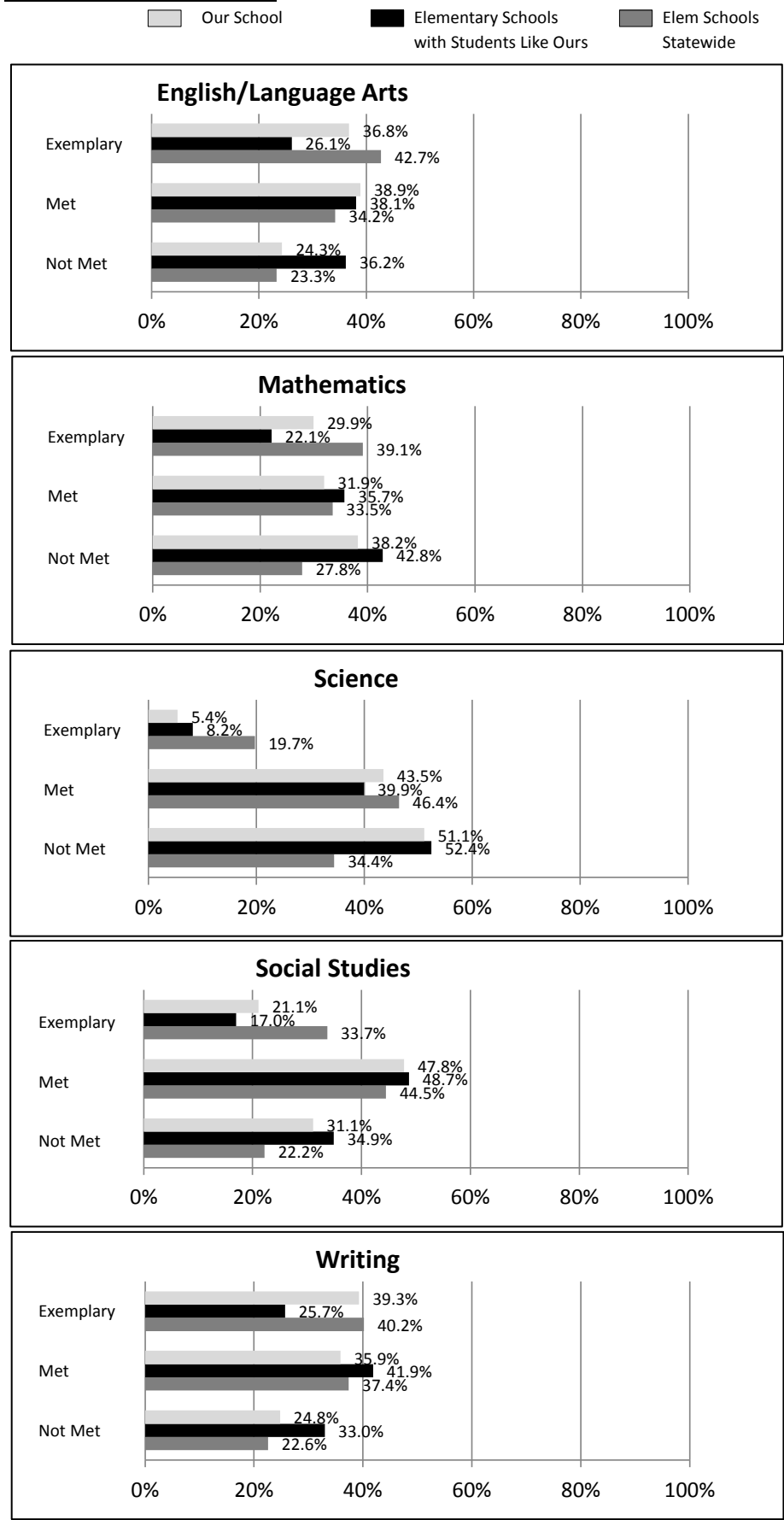

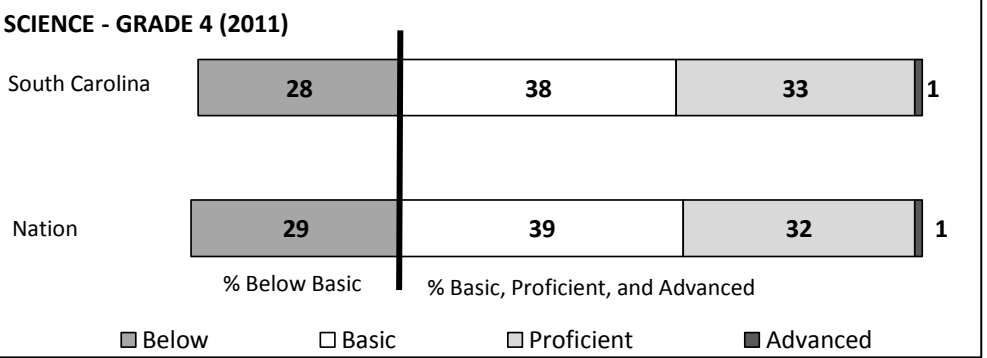

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

During the 2013-14 school year, Bradley Elementary School maintained its focus on teaching and learning and working to ensure academic success for every child every day. With our school motto in mind, “Excellence in Action,” our faculty and staff were committed to ensuring the academic growth of each student.

As the school continued to teach to the learning needs of every child, a “Response to Intervention/Balanced Literacy” block was built into the master schedule. This block allowed teachers to assess students’ individual learning needs in the core content areas and individualize instruction based on each students’ needs. To aid teachers in constantly looking at student data, the school implemented a data room in which student test data was readily accessible. The data room included student data on magnetic business cards complete with student photos and the students’ MAP scores (Fall, Winter & Spring), the previous year’s PASS scores, and NOT MET, MET or EXEMPLARY, as applicable. Teachers were able to use the data room as a means for gathering information on one student, groups of students, or grouping students into differentiated learning groups. Additionally, utilizing data from MAP, common assessments, teacher-made assessments and previous PASS scores, teachers focused on developing students’ areas of weakness and customizing instruction specific to the individual student.

This past school year, we continued to increase parental, community and stakeholder involvement and saw our parents/guardians and students celebrate and share in Bradley Elementary’s “First Annual Muffins for Moms”, as well as the school’s “First Annual Doughnuts for Dad”, both events proved to be tremendously successful and got parents involved in their students’ education in a less intimidating manner. Our community stakeholders continued to expand upon their academic relationship with our students by increasing the use of leveled-text to assist our students in making gains in their reading. Our Lunch Buddies Programs through Eastminster Presbyterian, Junior League of the Columbia and The Midlands Reading Consortium all provided regular small group, as well as one-on-one assistance to our 1st and 2nd grade students to ensure that our students became more confident with their reading skills. Bradley Elementary also increased our business partnerships to include The Solomon Law Group, LLC; Childs & Halligan, PA and the Bradley Law Firm. Our PTO and SIC was further developed and proved to be a huge support in assisting with many of the extra incentives/endeavors for our students and the school.

Our school-wide theme for the 2013-14 was “Excellence ‘Bee’gins With ME!” To this end our school year was spent helping our students to believe in themselves and further served as an affirmation to remind students to give their personal best daily. As a result we have seen great strides made and we look forward to continued “Excellence in Action”!
