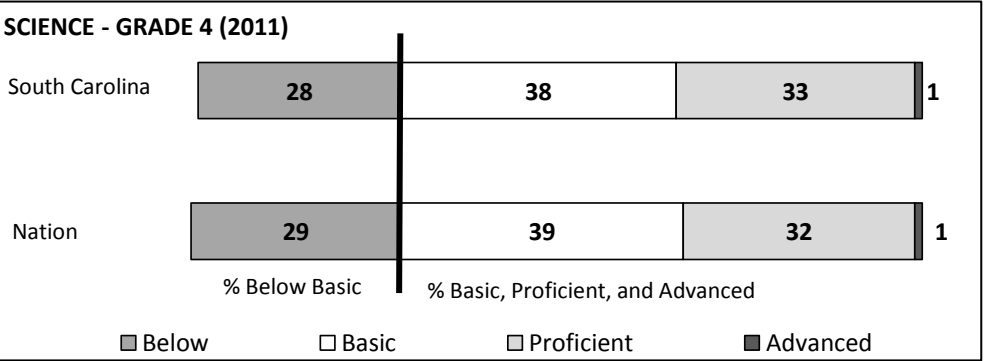

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The staff at Satchel Ford strives to improve the academic achievement for all students, with a continual focus on improving school safety, student health and technology in the classrooms. The School Improvement Council (SIC) worked closely with school administration and the district facilities department to install new fencing which enclosed the playground to increase the safety of students and staff. Through the third year of the NFL Fuel Up to Play 60 grant, health fairs and physical activity sessions were implemented to increase student understanding of living a healthy lifestyle. PTO undertook for the second year, a fundraiser called “Boosterthon” that focused on fitness, leadership, and character development. In the area of technology, PTO purchased an iPad for all certified teachers to use in their classrooms. In response to SIC’s request to provide informational sessions about teaching and learning, school safety, learning expectations, school data, and other related topics, administration and school staff offered a Parent University in February. Since 2004 Satchel Ford has been recognized as an Arts in Basic Curriculum (ABC) School by the South Carolina Arts Commission. Satchel Ford also has been a ten year recipient of the SC State Department of Education’s Distinguished Arts Program (DAP) grant. This grant money, along with funds raised by the Brave Arts Boosters, was utilized to support the arts program by funding a portion of the dance teacher’s position. This school year, the Arts team introduced and created new performances for students to showcase their talents in dance, music, and theater. [redacted]

Satchel Ford teachers continue to offer clubs for students before and after school hours. This year all clubs became student centered. Teachers became facilitators and introduced students to projects that empowered them to become creative, productive team players, and independent thinkers. Students participated in Book Club, Greenhouse, Sensations, Safety Patrol, Recycling, Girls on the Run, and Fuel Up to Play 60 Fitness Club. This year an Art Club, Nook Book Club, Dance Club, Honor Choir, 1-2-3 Choir, Yearbook Club, Crew Production Club and Visual Literacy Club were added. To empower student leadership, a group of 5th grade students worked with administration as members of the Principal’s Advisory Club. The Brave hearts Club was implemented to enhance student responsibility and build confidence for students. Again this year, selected Grade 3-5 students in the Braves Aftercare program performed in the steel drum band.[redacted]

A school-wide character education program was implemented this school year. Students were recognized for exhibiting positive character traits during community luncheons. Satchel Ford obtained its first charter as a National Elementary Honor Society. [redacted]
