Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing opportunities that challenge students in the areas of academic, personal, physical, and social development. Evidence of accomplishing this came when the South Carolina Department of Education awarded Waccamaw Elementary the Palmetto Silver Award for general performance. Driven by Common Core Standards, our staff provides a rigorous curriculum that provides opportunities for acceleration, remediation, and enrichment. This includes small group instruction, intervention and the gifted/ talented program. Waccamaw Elementary partners with Coastal Carolina University to provide mentor support from CCU students. Our desire is to work closely with all members of the school's community. We have accomplished this through our mentoring program with CCU, parent volunteers, community volunteers, and local service clubs such as the Rotary, Rotaract, and Kiwanis. The Rotary Club, in collaboration with Payless Shoes, sponsored a "Happy Feet" program which offered free shoes to many of our students. Our parent leadership team sponsored activities throughout the year such as a Staff-Parent Softball Game, Fall Fest, Talent Show and CD Tea Party. Students in grades three thru five have a laptop and we are working on increasing the number of iPads for the primary grades. Our teachers grow and work together by participating in professional development activities and focusing on instructional strategies to improve student achievement. Using grade-level collaborative planning time, teachers, coaches and administrators develop strategies for addressing student weaknesses, enriching the learning process and challenging students. We are committed to promoting a school environment conducive to learning, laughing, and growing together. This can be accomplished through the continued support and input from our parents, staff, students and community. It is also supported by being a PBIS school (Positive Behavior Intervention Support). Students are rewarded for their positive behavior in following our High 5s; Be Responsible, Be Respectful, Be Your Best, Be Honest and Be Safe. We look forward to 2015-2016 school year and will continue to prepare our students to be 21st century learners and leaders by focusing on individual growth and needs of each student. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



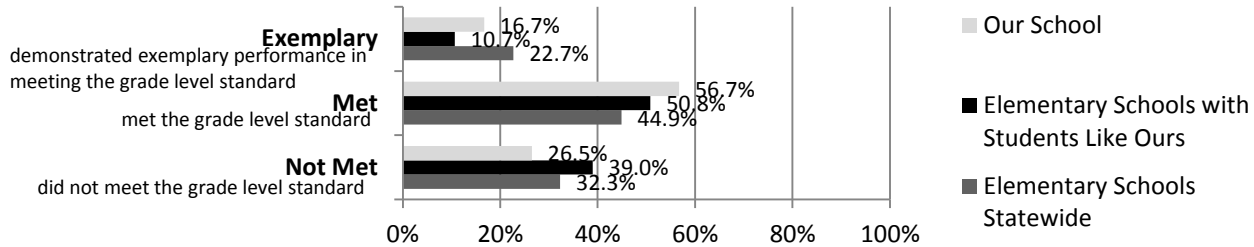

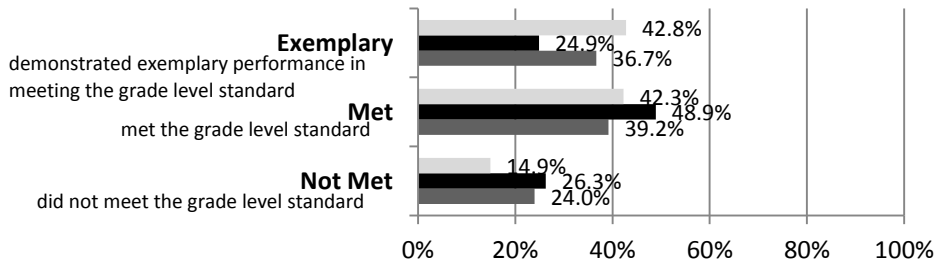
