Our school is helping all students develop world-class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by using the following procedures. Students and teachers at Frances Mack Intermediate School had two initiatives that we explored in depth during the 2014-15 school year. Using The Leader in Me and The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens, we developed and implemented a leadership program to help our students become goal-oriented and take ownership in their school. Each student set an academic and a personal goal at the beginning of each nine weeks and then worked toward meeting their goals. We also developed and staffed school-wide and classroom leadership roles so students are afforded voice and choice in programs they choose to support. Our other initiative is Project-Based Learning. Much of our professional development has been centered on creating and implementing project-based units. Our students worked diligently on a number of different projects from creating an ancient civilization cookbook, to clearing, creating, and labeling a nature trail for all classes to use. Students are developing skills needed to solve problems, think critically, synergize, and persevere to complete their projects. Our goal is for students to use content knowledge to think deeply and solve authentic problems as they work together in teams. We will continue with both of these initiatives as we help our students develop the world-class skills and life and career characteristics they need to be productive citizens in the 21st century. 




