

Our academic team qualified for the prestigious National Competition in Dallas, Texas, and our Battle of the Brains team finished in "The Elite Eight" this year. We had six student art winners in the Piedmont Interstate Fair, two winners in the Atlantic Institute of Art and Writing, and six award winners from Scholastic Art and Writing. In athletics, our eighth grade football team finished first in their conference division, our girls' volleyball team were regular season and Peachtree tournament champions, and our boys' basketball team was the Peachtree tournament champion. Again this year, our Bearcats were committed to helping others in need and were busy supporting local charitable causes. Our student council led our student body in fundraising efforts for Relay for Life and the Spartanburg Soup Kitchen. 
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
## KNOWLEDGE
