### WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

*Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...*

The Lexington 4 Early Childhood Center (ECC) is helping students develop World-Class Skills and Life and Career Characteristics as defined by the Profile of the Graduate by living fully into our purpose: To prepare a learning environment that nurtures the whole child while building a partnership with families and the community. The learning environment refers to classroom relationships among teachers, students, and families, materials, outdoor learning areas, and the entire school. Our building is designed to allow maximum independence of children, while guarding safety above all. We utilize the Montessori philosophy. Classroom materials are designed to scaffold learning for a three-year period with the same teacher/facilitator. The teacher, as observer, supports the personalization of learning and interest-based student decisions through five learning areas: Language, Math, Sensorial, Practical Life, and Science/Art/Culture. Materials are self-correcting and foster essential skills for developing judgment, order, concentration, independence, control of movement, care of self and the environment, grace and courtesy, and food and nutrition. The child develops independence and self-sufficiency through individualized work. The Montessori philosophy supports building strong executive function skills. All of the direct and indirect aims are absorbed by the young child's developing brain, taking advantage of their absorbent mind and rapidly connecting synapses. To forge a partnership between families and the community, the ECC's PALS program helps students and families build 21st century skills. PALS meets monthly to strengthen parents' knowledge of their child's development and school progress as well as family bonds. There are three predictable structures: Social/Emotional Development Study (7 Habits of Highly Effective Families), Educational Development (Focus on 21st Century Skills), and Family Literacy Activity. Each family receives a book for their home library. PALS has grown over 400 percent since opening the ECC five years ago. Adult Education is housed in the ECC. Free daycare is provided for participants who have children younger than three. Also housed at the ECC is First Steps, which consists of parent educators, and Jump Start, which provides classes for mothers and their two year olds. Both groups partner with the ECC Guidance Counselor and Instructional Coach to include those families in PALS. Our purpose guides every aspect of the work we do at the ECC as we prepare the foundation for our students to be college, career, and citizenship ready.
